My dear General:-

I have received your letter of February 15th. You will admit that it is rather remarkable that Dr. Gill should make a mistake of several years <sup>(9)</sup> with reference to the date of his birth. The statement made in his autobiography before he contemplated entering the Regular Army was definite that he was born on the 5th of June, 1861. Moreover, he gives the date of his graduation as May 13, 1884. If he was born, as he now claims, in 1866, he was but eighteen years old when he graduated in medicine, and I understand that diplomas are not conferred upon men less than twenty-one years of age by the college from which he graduated. This matter will have to be investigated in the most careful way if Dr. Gill presents himself for examination. Certainly if he has made a false statement with reference to the date of his birth for the purpose of gaining admission to the Medical Corps of the Army he is not a suitable man to become a member of the Corps.
