



Paragraph 294 Academic Regulations is amended to read as follows, viz:

Officers of the Military Academy wishing to be absent from the Post for a few hours, when not required for their regular duties, will govern themselves by the rules and articles of War, and the General Regulations for the Army. - Both of the made Officers shall not be absent from the Post at the same time. Applications by officers of the Institution, for leaves of absence to exceed twelve hours, will be made in writing through the Adjutant, and presented at least six hours before the desired time of departure, and to procure any leave authorizing absence from duty the application shall be made and presented in like manner, receiving beforehand the action of the chief of the department to which the officer belongs. - When granted, before availing himself of it, the officer shall make a record of the commencement & expiration of his leave, in a book kept for that purpose in the Adjutant's Office, and on his return give the date thereof in the same book."





The Army will commence retiring at 7 1/2 o'clock P.M. and in the following order - The 5th Corps will retire by the centre route, the 1st on the right, the 3rd on the left of that Corps, and all will be preceded by the Artillery, and these will be followed by the 2nd Corps - the latter passing to the rear from the left as fast as the covering column close in on its left - to be followed by the 11th + 12th Corps in the same order. -

A heavy line of skirmishers will be kept out and will follow the withdrawal at a distance of about 300 yards. -

The covering columns on each road will be within supporting distance, and should be nearly abreast of each other. - - -

On passing the 2nd line of defence the covering columns, if it ^{should be} necessary, will establish themselves on the 2nd line in the same order in which they stood
on

on the line abandoned.---

Each Corps after passing the river will take charge of, and protect its own train passing to its own Camps.---

The rear guard, Major General Meade, will cover the withdrawal of the bridges, and will not retire until all is secure.---

I. The Camp now established at Beaufort, S.C. for the organization and instruction of Colored troops in the Department of the South will hereafter be known as "Camp Stanton" in honor of the Hon: Secretary of War. The first order authorizing the enlistment of Colored Soldiers into the Army of the United States, was sent to the undersigned, July 25, 1862, by the Secretary of War, who thus gave the colored man an opportunity to prove his manhood and vindicate his right of freedom, and as much as any one official act, aided to secure the final success of the cause of Liberty and Union.

II. Colonel C. H. Howard, 128th U. S. C. Troops, is assigned to the Command of the Camp and will superintend the instruction of officers and soldiers in the Army regulations and tactics and make all necessary rules for the government of the Camp in

III By order from the War Department it is hereby announced, that from the date of the receipt of the same, April 27, 1865 - no more bounties will be paid recruits, all who enlist hereafter will receive sixteen (\$16) dollars per month with clothes and rations.

It is hoped and believed that this stoppage of the bounties will in no manner diminish the number of recruits, but that the freed men will honor themselves by showing to the Country, that they have a higher motive for joining the Army, than the mere bounty, and that they will come forward by thousands, and eagerly embrace the opportunity of becoming soldiers, to secure their own freedom and that of their race forever.




