The Class of 1825 Digital Edition



From Club to Cause: Student Groups and the Politics of Voice at Bowdoin

Curated by Beck Silva '26 with contributions from Dakota Wilson '27, our major Fall 2025 exhibition considers the historical role of student organizations in shaping Bowdoin's culture and values. Across generations, Bowdoin students have found and built community through shared interests, goals, and identities.



Student groups have not only envisioned but have also advanced a more inclusive Bowdoin. *From Club to Cause* uses the College archives to trace how students have met the tension between ideals and institutional limits head-on, trying to make the word "Bowdoin" mean home. Black Biography

The third-floor exhibit case features the creative works by students in Tess Chakkalakal's Spring 2025 Africana Studies/English course, Black Biography. Inspired by historical materials in SC&A, these works offer reimagined biographies of historical figures, including Bowdoin's first



and second Black graduates (John Russwurm, Class of 1826. and Samuel Dreer, Class of 1910). Join us on <u>October 7 at 4:30 pm</u> to celebrate the exhibit and the student creators.

John James Audubon,
John Bachman, and

Quadrupeds of North
America. New York:

Audubon, 1849-1854
John James Audubon
didn't just love birds. He
also was fascinated with

the mammals of North
America. Upon completing
his double elephant folio
of the *Birds of America* (a
copy of which is on view in
the Reading Room of
Special Collections &
Archives), Audubon
turned his attention to his
second and last
monumental project,
documenting the
viviparous (bringing forth



live young) animals. He was joined in this work by his longtime friend and colleague Rev. John Bachman, who provided the text, and his son John Woodhouse Audubon, who assisted with the images. Originally published by subscription in a larger folio size, the octavo edition on view here was issued in three volumes in 1849, 1851, and 1854. A recent gift to Special Collections & Archives from Ines and Dr. Fredrick Yeatts, this copy is bound in full Morocco with a gilt illustration of a Wild-Cat on the upper cover. It first belonged to George Arthur, one of Audubon's original subscribers.

The Bruce Kennett W. A. Dwiggins Collection

These members of Bowdoin's "most famous" class are depicted in silhouette--they graduated fourteen years before the advent of photography--and the cards are embellished in gold. A Wide Variety of Views: The Photography of Leon B. Strout



In 1937, the Bowdoin College Library received a large collection of more than 5,000 images from the Brunswick-based photographer Leon B. Strout who captured scenes in Midcoast Maine and farther afield in the late 19th and early 20th century. SC&A long recognized the historical importance of these materials, but it was only through a recent generous donation from Strout's descendants that we have been able to

undertake the digitization and publication of Strout's entire body of work. Katie Perry, the Leon B. Strout Photographic Archivist, has already completed the digitization of more than 5,000 images, many of which are already available **online**. In Spring 2026, SC&A will hold a major exhibition of his work and will release a photographic book that contextualizes and illustrates the range and significance of Strout's work.
