

JOSEPH LYMAN FISHER, of the Class of 1935, *magna cum laude*, Phi Beta Kappa, member of Delta Upsilon, President of Resources for the Future, Incorporated. Well founded in economics at Bowdoin, the London School of Economics, and Harvard University, after an instructorship in Economics at Allegheny College, he early found his future when he joined the National Resources Planning Board in 1939. Interrupted by Infantry service in the Second World War, he soon resumed his career as Economist and Executive Officer of the President's Council of Economic Advisers. His later service with Resources for the Future marks his dedication to a purpose paradoxically single but multiple, - multiple in its many manifestations, and broad in its implications – the future of natural resources, in his home County of Arlington, Virginia, in the United States of America, in the underdeveloped countries of the Near and Far East, of Latin America, and Africa, indeed of the world. Deeply sensitive to the deterioration of our domestic environment, he seeks careful assessment and constructive action rather than mere yielding to panic. From his keen awareness of the gravity of the crises in world populations and economic conditions surrounding the “complexity of the world energy and minerals economy,” its food and its agriculture, he hopes to build understanding on solid facts, to search out lasting solutions rather than temporary panaceas.
