

**EVERETT FREDERIC MORROW**, of the Class of 1930, lawyer, banker, public servant. Your career has been a varied and rich one; it has also been history-making in that you became the first black man to serve as a White House aide when President Eisenhower appointed you an administrative assistant. Before your government career had begun, you had already indicated your active concern for your fellow man by serving as a Field Secretary for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and as a member of the Public Affairs Staff of the Columbia Broadcasting System. As Vice President for Public Affairs of the African-American Institute, you dedicated yourself to the development of better cultural and educational relationships between the people of Africa and the United States. As Vice President of the Bank of America, New York, you have been concerned with the foreign loan and business development field. You have been an active participant in the affairs of New York City and have long shown concern for underprivileged young people. Your leadership has been rightly termed brilliant; your commitment to helping others has been a rich realization of the College's historic mission to be an institution serving the common good.
