

**JOHN HAROLD PLUMB**, scholar, editor, teacher, and cultural ambassador of Anglo-American understanding. A graduate of London and Cambridge Universities, he is without peer among English historians of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. His magisterial volumes on Walpole, his brilliant study of the growth of political stability in England, and his numerous essays on aspects of eighteenth-century life all stand as models of the historian's craft. Like all great historians, his horizons are wide, for he has written with equal penetration about the crisis in the humanities and about the nature of the historian's work, as well as undertaking essays in social history, a study of the Renaissance, and an account of West African exploration. From shortest review to longest tome, he writes with a controlled mastery of the language that is wholly admired and more than occasionally envied. A distinguished teacher as well, he has been a Fellow of Christ's College, Cambridge, Professor of Modern English history, and Chairman of the History Faculty at Cambridge. His visiting appointments have included the Ford Lectureship at Oxford and distinguished visiting appointments at Columbia, City College, Minnesota, the University of the City of New York, Reading, and Texas Christian University., as well as the Cole Lectureship at Bowdoin. Devoted to the fostering of Anglo-American understanding, he has worked with vigor to bring scholars in our two nations together and he himself typifies this trans-Atlantic bond. The model of the teacher-scholar, he embodies the great strength and vision of the Anglo-American academic tradition.

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
