LACEY BALDWIN SMITH, of the Class of 1944, teacher, scholar, biographer. A native of Princeton, N.J., he graduated from Bowdoin following service with the Army Air Corps in Bangalore, India, from 1943-1946. The recipient of M.A. and Ph.D. degrees at Princeton University, he has been a Fulbright Scholar, Guggenheim Fellow, and Senior Fulbright Fellow at the University of London, as well as being an Honorary Research Fellow at University College, London, and a Senior Fellow of the National Endowment for the Humanities. After teaching at Princeton and M.I.T., he joined the faculty at Northwestern University in 1955 and he has continued to add lustre to the distinguished history department since then. A prolific author, he has established his place as one of the foremost modern interpreters of Tudor England. From his first study, Tudor Prelates and Politics, to his recent Elizabeth Tudor: Biography of a Queen, he has with insight, originality, and lively prose made a turbulent period of English history come alive for his readers. He is one of those scholars who combines the highest standards of professionalism with the capacity to write for a wide audience. Nowhere is that skill better shown than in his *Henry VII: The Mask of Royalty*, a challenging and original study that reveals new dimensions to the biographer's art. Devoted to the search for truth that is the scholar's goal, enlivened by the excitement of it all, and committed to the challenging task of teaching, he embodies to the full the deepest and most profound mission of the College.

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
