

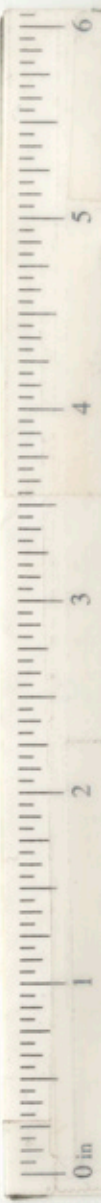

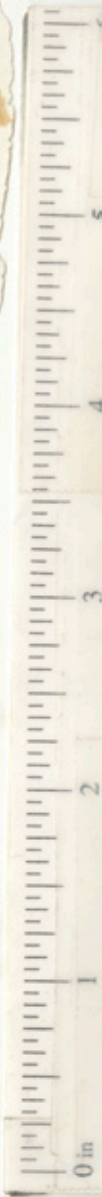

Maj. Genl. C. O. Howard

Dear General.

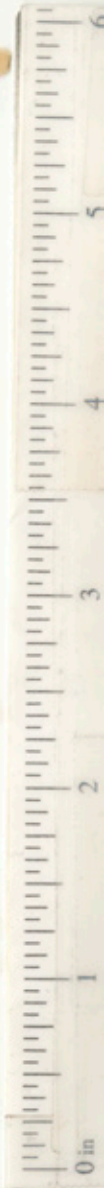

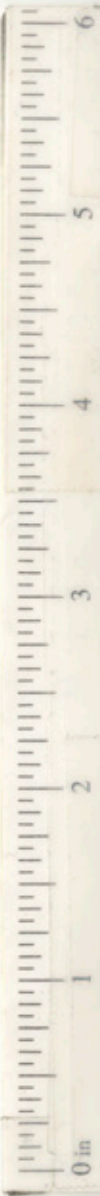

The sum of the note is \$122,63 after deducting discount, which with 3.68-6 mos interest makes \$12631.

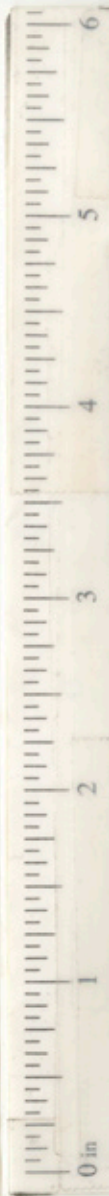

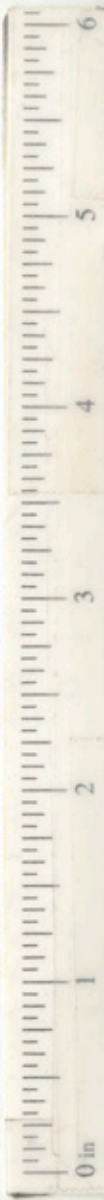
