General -

In the conversation I had with you on the train from the east to Pittsburg, you mentioned one difficulty you had to contend against in administering the duties of your office. Was the lack of efficient officers. My brother in-law Capt R. S. La Motte of the 13th Infy, is at present in this city. Under orders to rejoin his regiment in Montana Territory. He has been on a general recruiting service at Harrisburg Pa since the first of the year, and has been delayed here by illness. He expects to start for his command at the expiration of the twenty days covered by the last Surgeon's certificate. It is simply im-

possible for him to reach his command
before early summer. Stationed as it is
near the boundary line of British Amer-
ica. He will doubtless be detained
by some commanding officer en route.

The Captain is an officer
of a great deal of experience in all matters
relating to the service. And his record dur-
ing the war is perfect in every respect.
He was Colonel of the 1st Delaware
Vol - which he organized - in the three
month service. and is the ranking
captain in his Regiment. Within a very
few files of his Majority. If you can
avail yourself of his services, you will
find him all you would desire in any
branch of the Bureau under your charge.

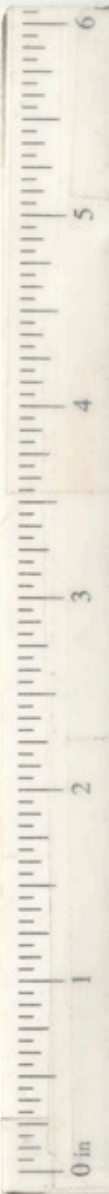
