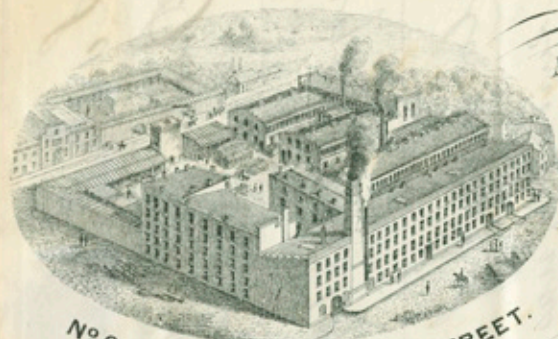

Dollars per acre

Dear Sir

Large Extracts from your recent letter to Senator Wilson have been referred to General Sprague through Genl Howard.

Conscious only of a sincere desire to promote in every way the success of the Republican Party, as the party of the Union, and to place the entire control of the State in the hands of loyal men, Genl Sprague will not take notice of complaints such as you make, except to make them the basis of inquiry, and move caution in the future action. But it seems to me, that, knowing all the facts, and knowing that the General has only the kindest feelings toward you personally and being anxious that there shall be no

misunderstandings and heartburing among you
-selves which a few words of explanation from
me may remove, I take this occasion to mention
you.

There was no other application
for appointment as Sheriff of Sumter Co. but
that of Thos. L. Beville. Quite a time was

suffered to elapse before he was appointed,
and even then he was referred to Maj. C. M.
Pierce of the Bureau at Danvers (who is a thor-
-ough Republican Union man himself), and the
appointment was finally made upon
Pierce's commendatory report. He did not
look for into Beville's past history, but voted
for him sincerely as a Union man ever since
he had known him. When the ap-

pointment of Probate Judge was pending, and
candidates were plenty, the utmost care
was exercised to find out who was the choice
of the Union men of the County, and that man
Mr. Abraham was appointed in the face of
the strongest efforts of the unscrupulous to make
another man put in. More recently

Gov. Patton recommends another man for
Prosecuting Attorney - R. Chapman Jr. We have
no other name presented, notwithstanding every
effort made on our part to have our friends
send us recommendations for all vacancies.

I sent out 1000 circulars all over the
State as soon as Guil Pope's order requiring
recommendations for appointment to be made by
the Governors of the States was published - asking
that duplicate recommendations be sent to
me, for the very purpose of aiding loyal men
to head off rebel applicants, but no notice
seems to have been taken of it by the loyal men
of your county.

Your application for
appointment as Circuit Court Judge receives
the favorable endorsement of Judge Smith
and myself, but there is no vacancy, and
Guil Pope who has sole charge of that busi-
ness will not remove incumbents except for
cause.

We have left nothing undone
to put our friends up as to what he con-
sidered cause. If I had my way

in the matter. Every able Probate Judge
and Sheriff would be removed instantly
if only that the immense patronage of these
offices should be used to help sustain a
newspaper, but our efforts to this end have
failed, and it will not make us feel
any better to discuss the cause. We
have got to fight out the battle of recon-
struction against the whole rebel power, with all
the patronage and official influence a-
gainst us, but we can do it and win
the fight. The sooner we can bring
on the election the sooner we will win
all these troubles vanished. Meanwhile
we are waiting to learn who you have made
the Republican County Committee for your
county. You have no organization that
I know of in your county. If you
had one taking charge of these and all
other matters in your county you would
find quite a large & anxious to help
along the work in every way as you could make

As it is only John Hill a black man
secretary of the Conway Council of the Union
League in your home county seems to be
at work for the success of the cause in a
way at all commensurate with its impor-
-ance.

I trust that you will
at once put us into communication with an
active & efficient County organization.
