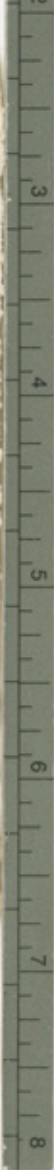

You may remember probably, I visited you on two occasions in Washington, at your office - respecting my son Capt Frank Adsbourn - on once with Col Gorham formerly of 1st Regt. Dpt.

At that time, (a year ago last May -) he was 1st Lieut. in the V. Reserve Corps, you recommended him to the Freedman's Bureau. Now ~~he~~ occupies the same place in Louisiana. Magnum, his duties

have been heavy, he has shown
a very efficient officer. Like yourself
he has but one arm. he has ac-
complished a very large amount
of Labor. —

For the past Four Months, he
states he has been obliged to do
double duty, from the absence
of other officers - he states also
necessity has compelled him to
study Law, What he now asks,
is to be kept employed by the
Government, if the Bureau
should be abolished when
congress assemble - No respect
has been paid to his application
for the Regular Army - his competency,
for ability & discretion, will bear the
test of rigid examination.

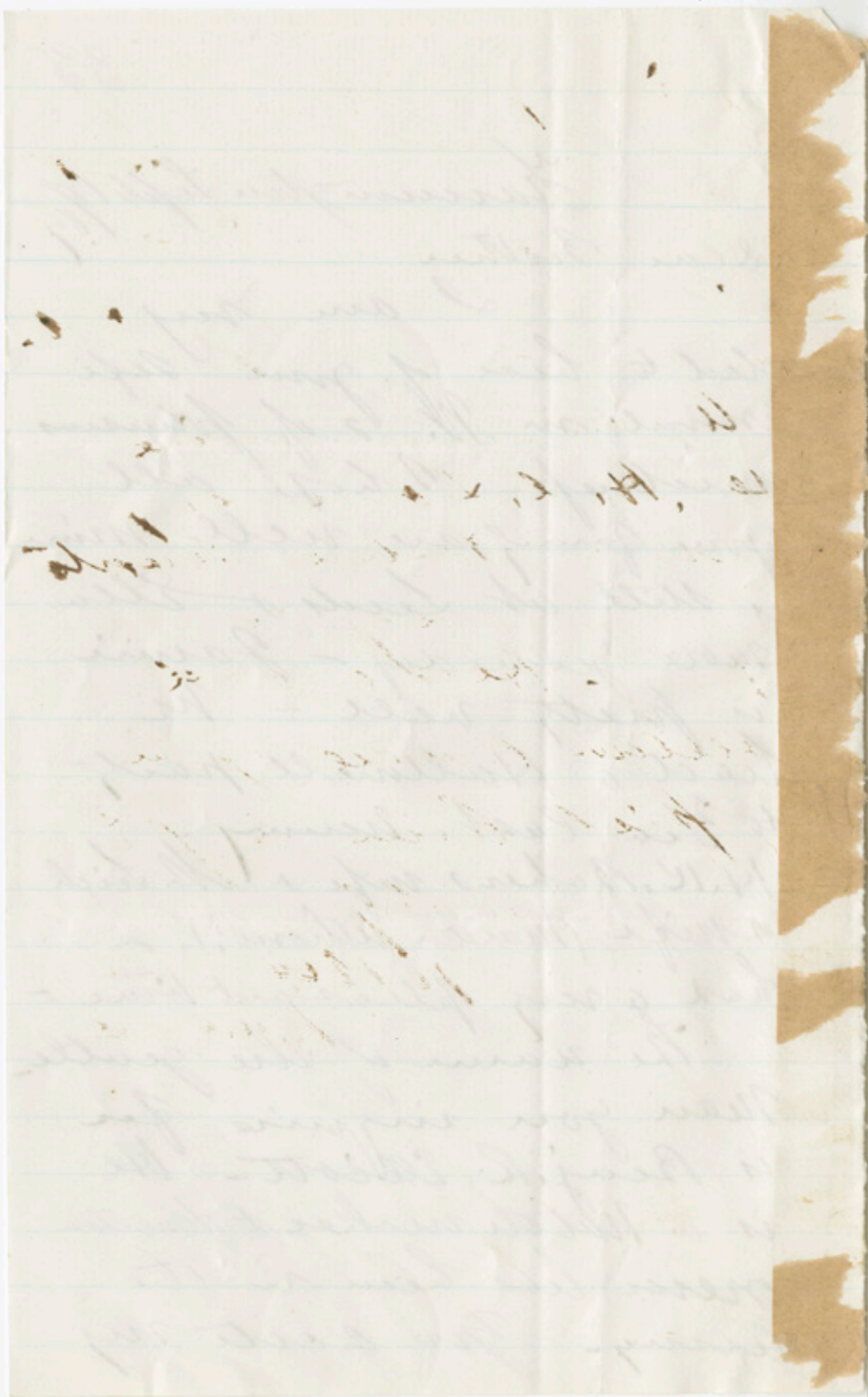
