Your circular soliciting aid for the completion of the Congregational Church in Washington came duly to hand, and should have been answered before this.

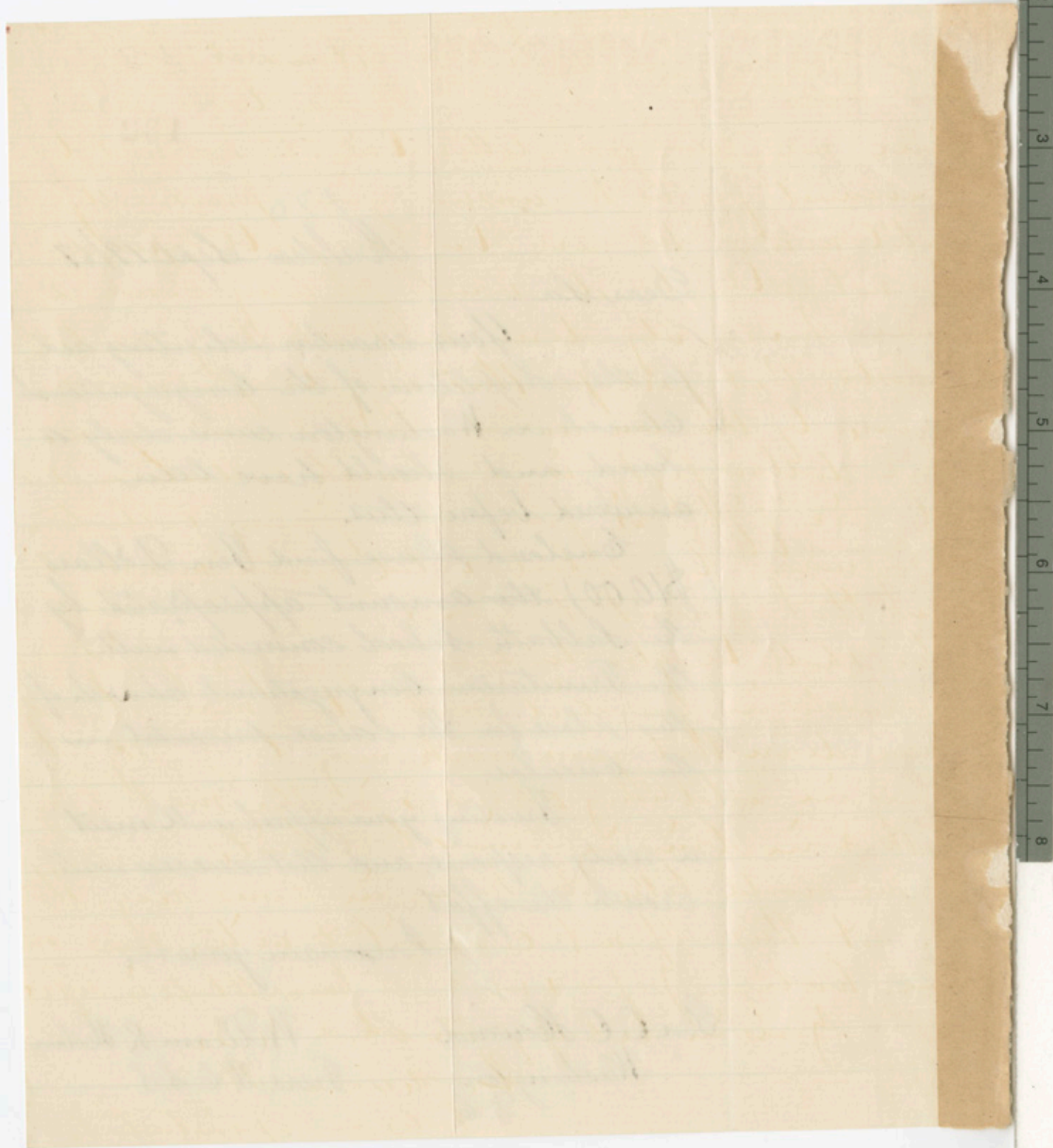

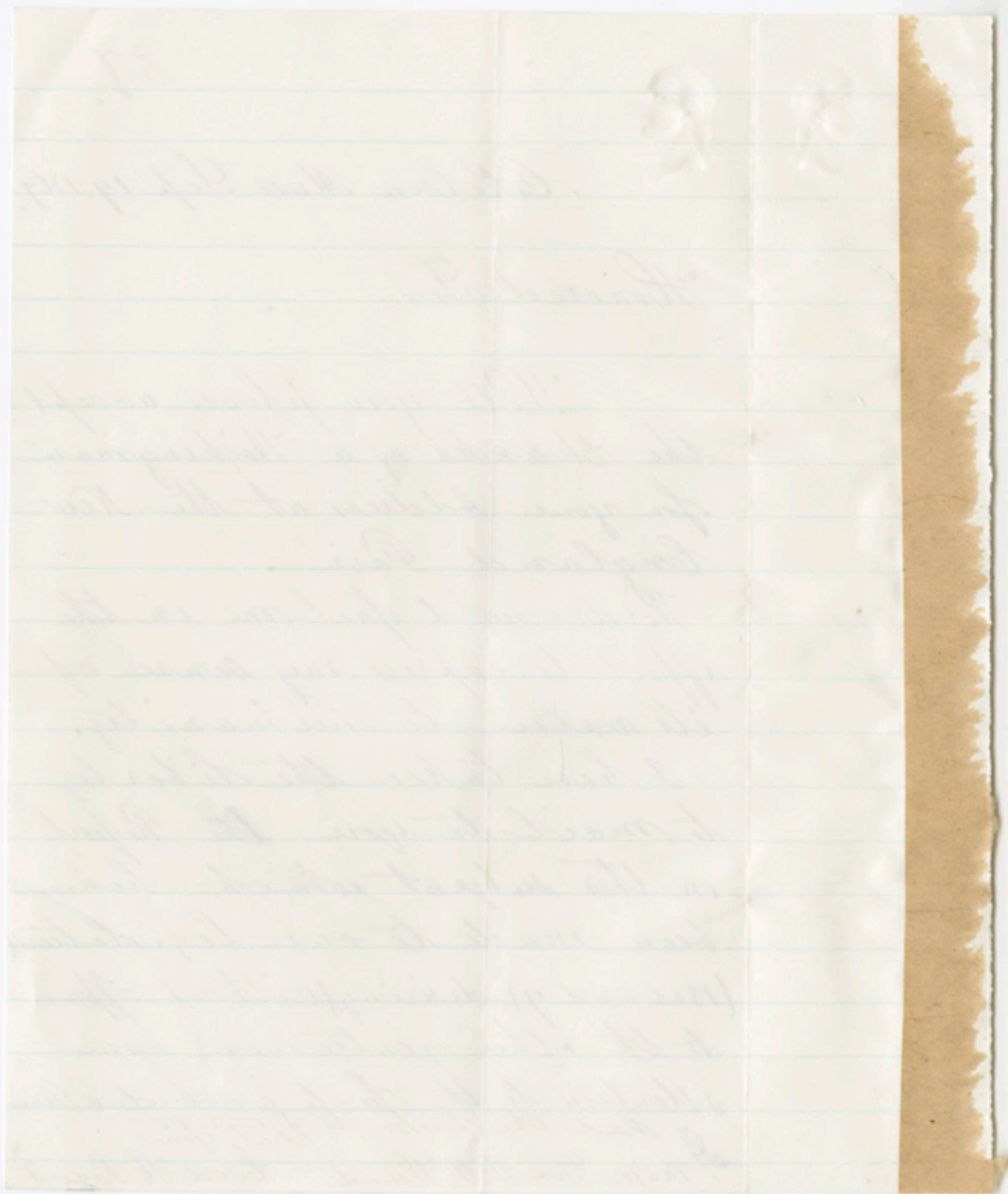

My Dear General,

You are of course aware of the sad event of Gen. Griffin's death, — in him the public service loses a faithful and efficient servant, and I with many others, a true and constant friend. —

The General on September 3rd issued a Circular marked N^o 7, in which he designates my firm to receive and sell the Freedmen's Crops in Texas, and embodies the necessary instructions to the Sub. Ass^t, Com^{rs} & Agents of the Bureau, as agreed in our conversation two months ago; — My sincere thanks to you General, for your instrumentality in the premises.

I have not yet seen announced the new Ass^t Commissioner for the State of Texas, nor do I know what steps are expedient or necessary to insure the enforcement of General Griffin's generous instructions in my behalf; — may I therefore General, solicit your advice and kind support. —

In a few days I shall have to visit Washington, and will then take the liberty of paying

my respects, - meanwhile may I hope to hear from you at
your earliest convenience. -

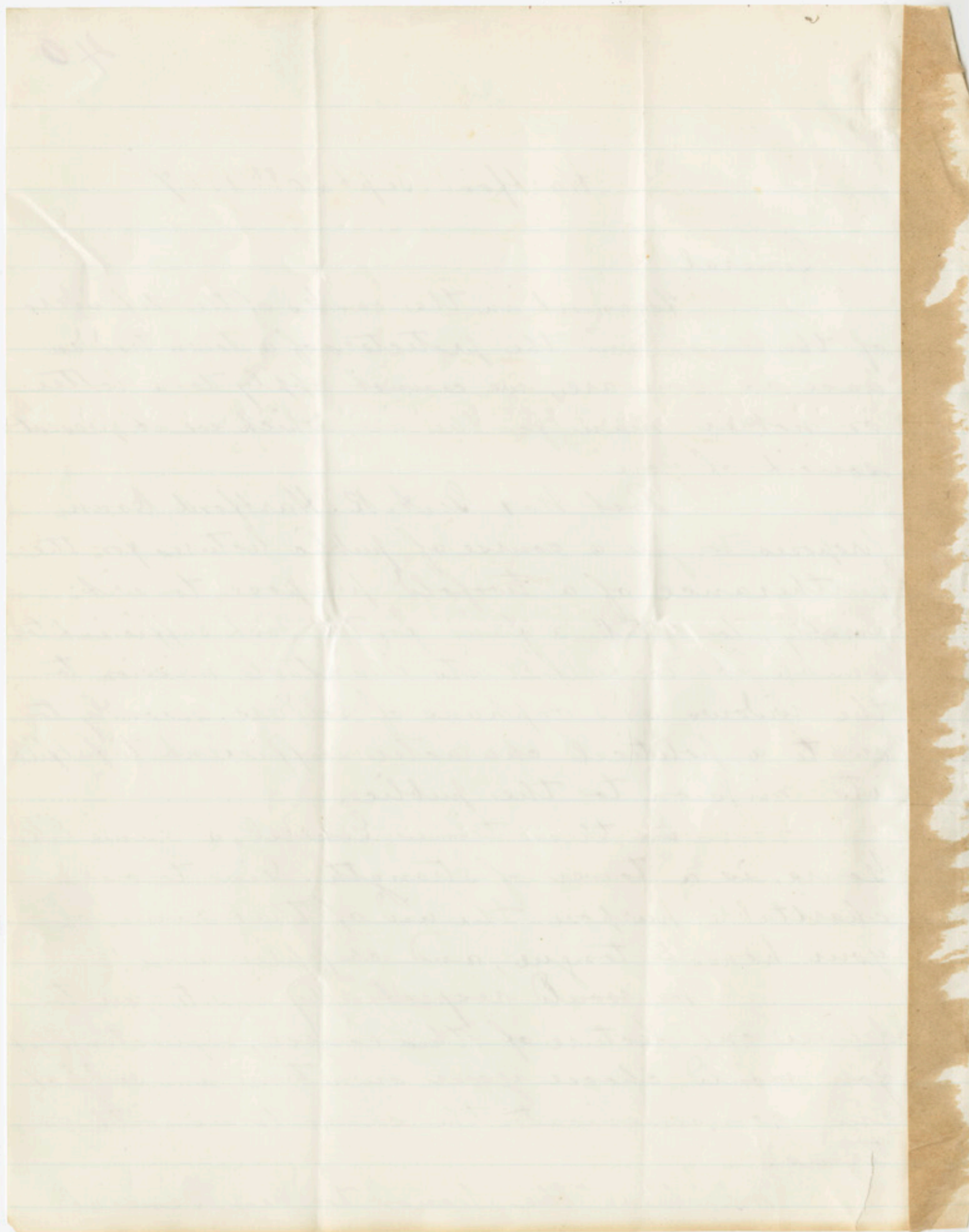

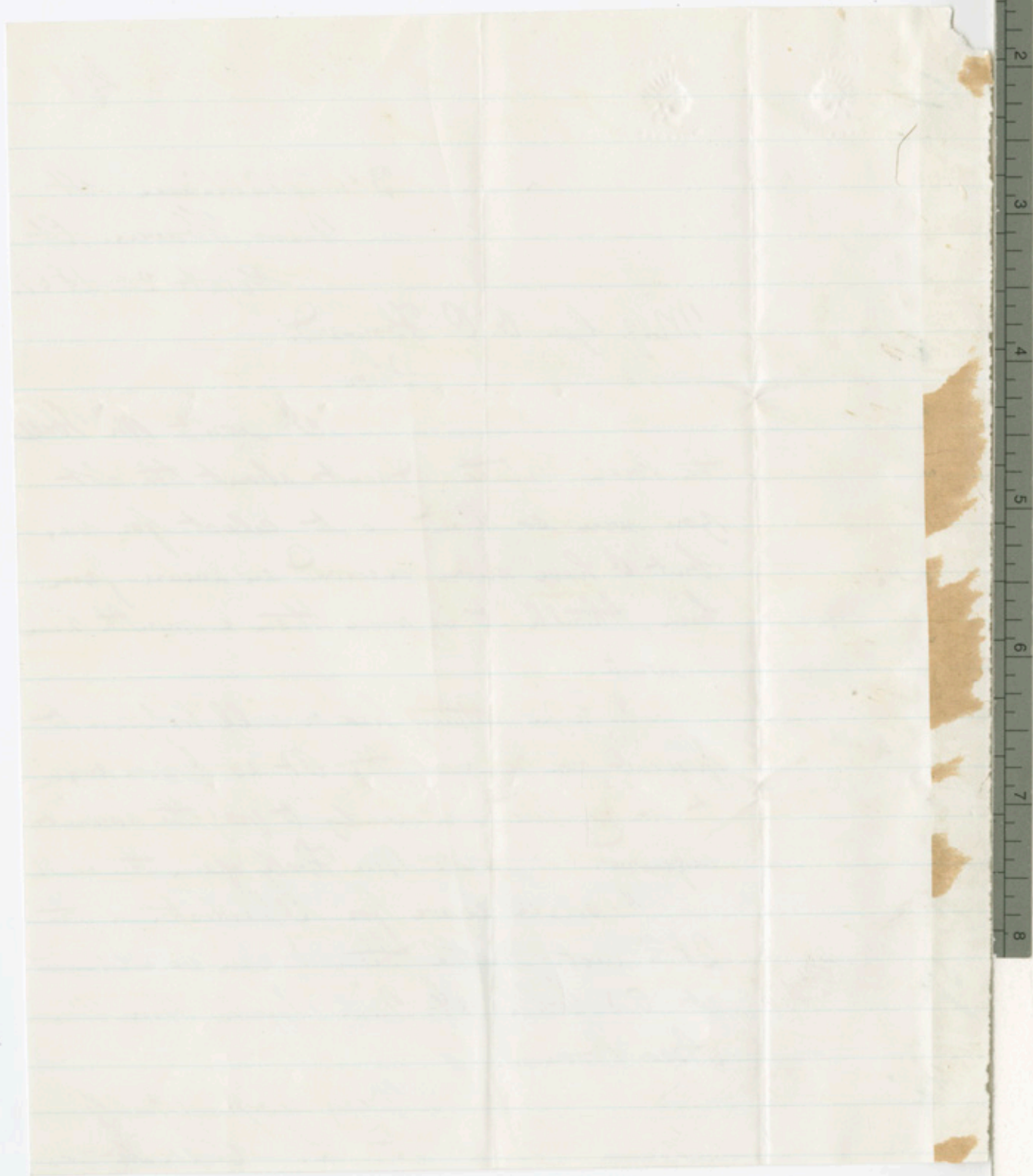
Maj. Gen. O. O. Howard.
