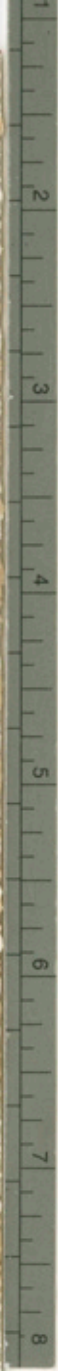
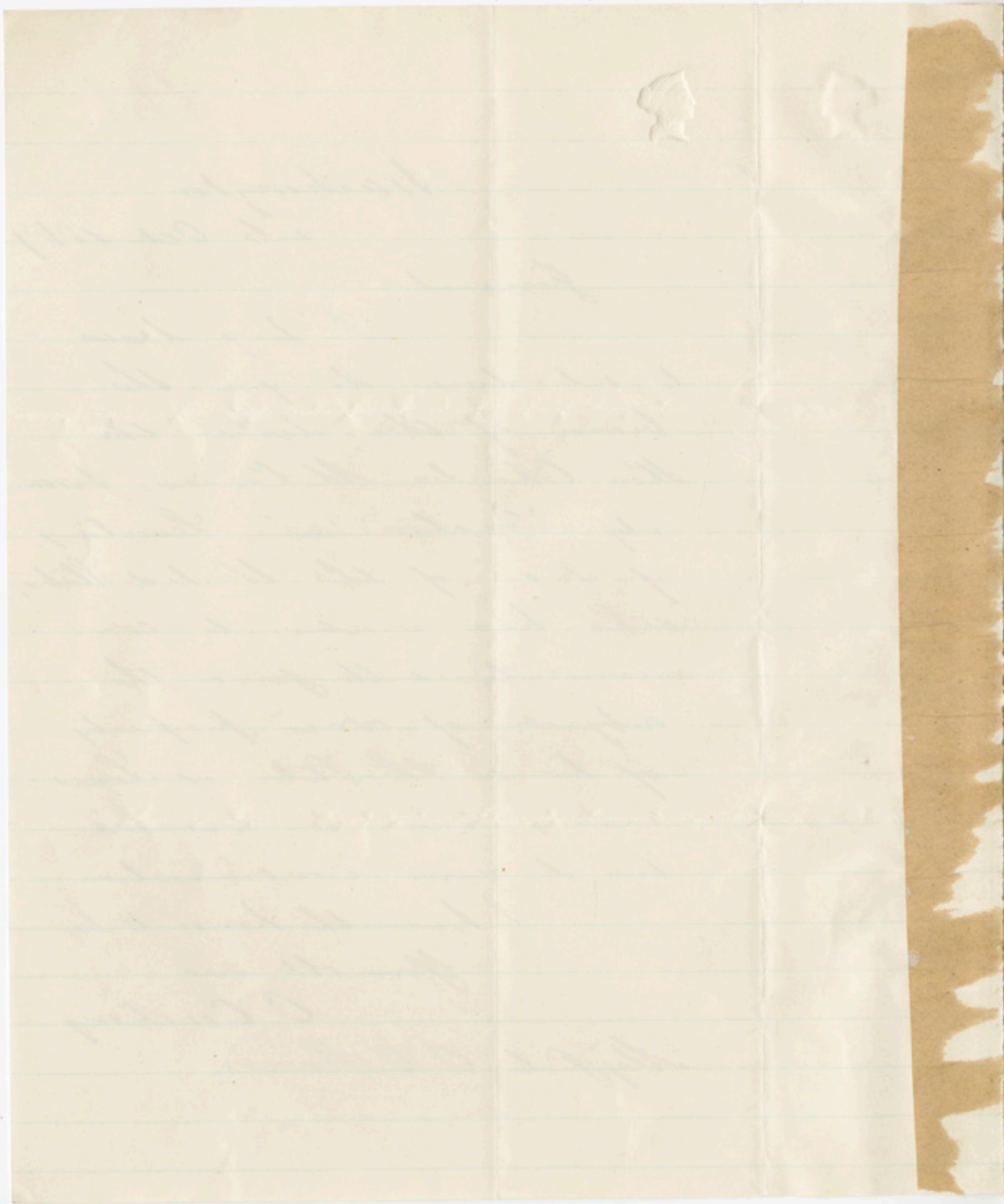

Sir:

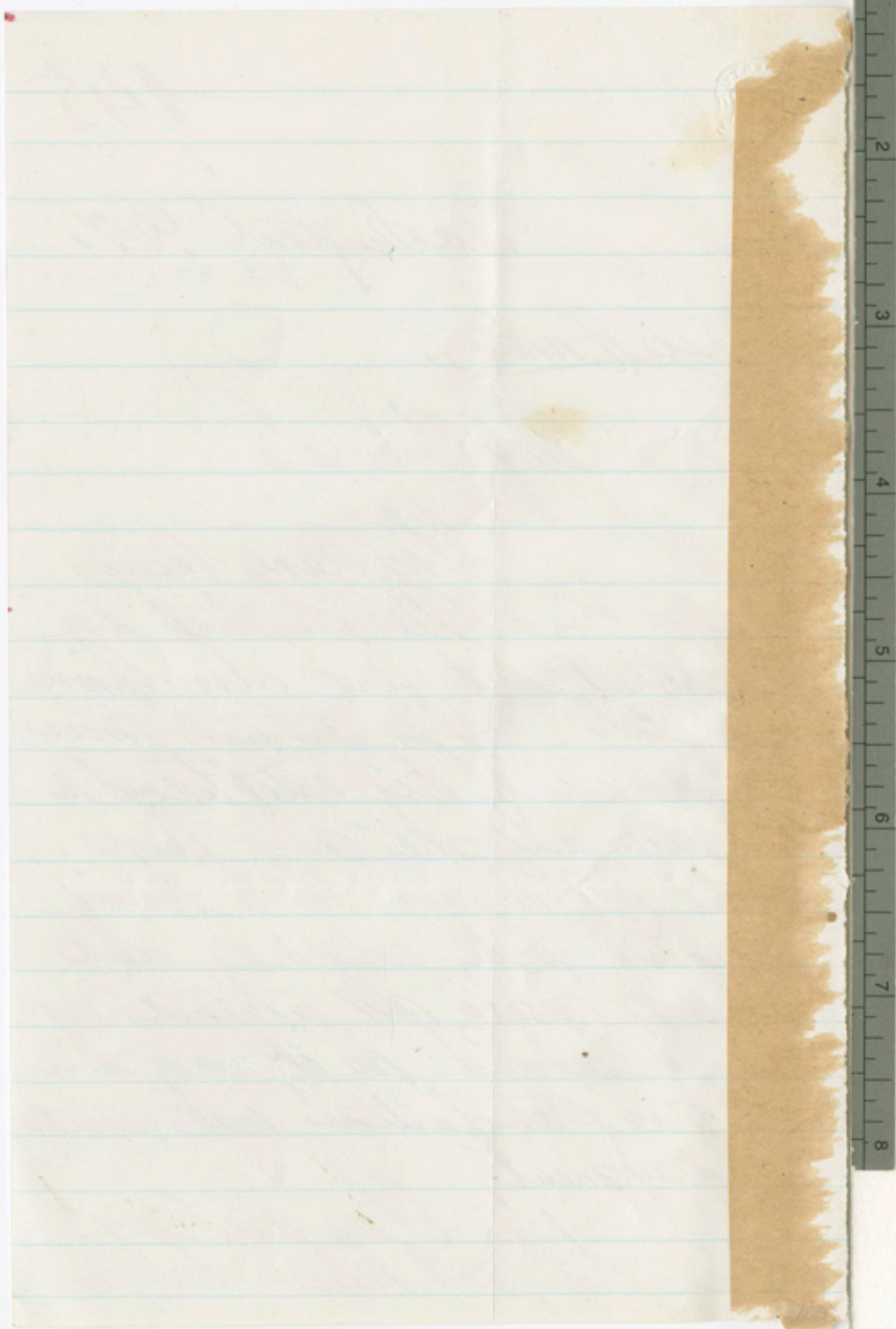

your own good Judgement.

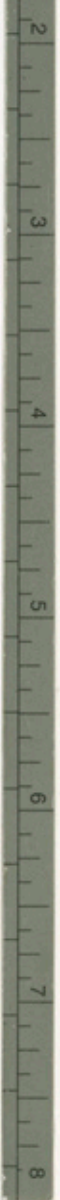
I think the affair will be a success
