that the Lord is on your side.
I trust you may be able to
carry out your purpose of a call
at my house in which I shall
feel honored & can freely inter-
change thought with you & for
which I shall be grateful - but
I could not but drop a line to
you at this time hurriedly
as I must always write to
express to you my most sincere
sympathy and assure you of my
lancet prayers however unmerited.

Please dont think hard
of my troubling you so often, It is because I
think so much of you. Believing you to
be a friend; a friend in need, is one in
deed. Not long since I received some
Blank forms, to be filled up by Persons that
had Property taken from them, ^{during the war}, from some
Lawyers at Washington City.

It turns from an act of Congress passed July
4th 1864, that Persons that lost their Property in
the way I lost mine, would be paid by the
Government on application with an acre proper-
ly made out - I have made out as
nearly as I can according to directions, for
the articles of Provisions, Eatables & drinkables,
Stock, Horses, cattle, Dogs, House hold &
Kitchen furniture & tools including \$400 in
Gold, amounting to over \$15,000. Will you
allow me to make you a Power attorney
to say my claim before the Proper tribunal
at Washington City. - If I can procure your
assistance in that way as well as your
influence & you will allow me to pay you
if Successfull - I will pay you Mighty
well, You know my Situation, my age
and my Loyalty better than any one in that
place, Notwithstanding I will have all that,
well Certified to before my claim leaves
this place, - Please drop me

a time, I hope you will act as my attorney, - I have also understood that Congress has or will Pass a law, granting 1812 Soldiers a Pension for life, if so that will help this old man to live, a little better, - If Congress will allow my just claim that I am preparing to lay before them, I will be satisfied, with that amount which is as just as any thing ever was or can be,) I shall be able keep out of the Poor house.
