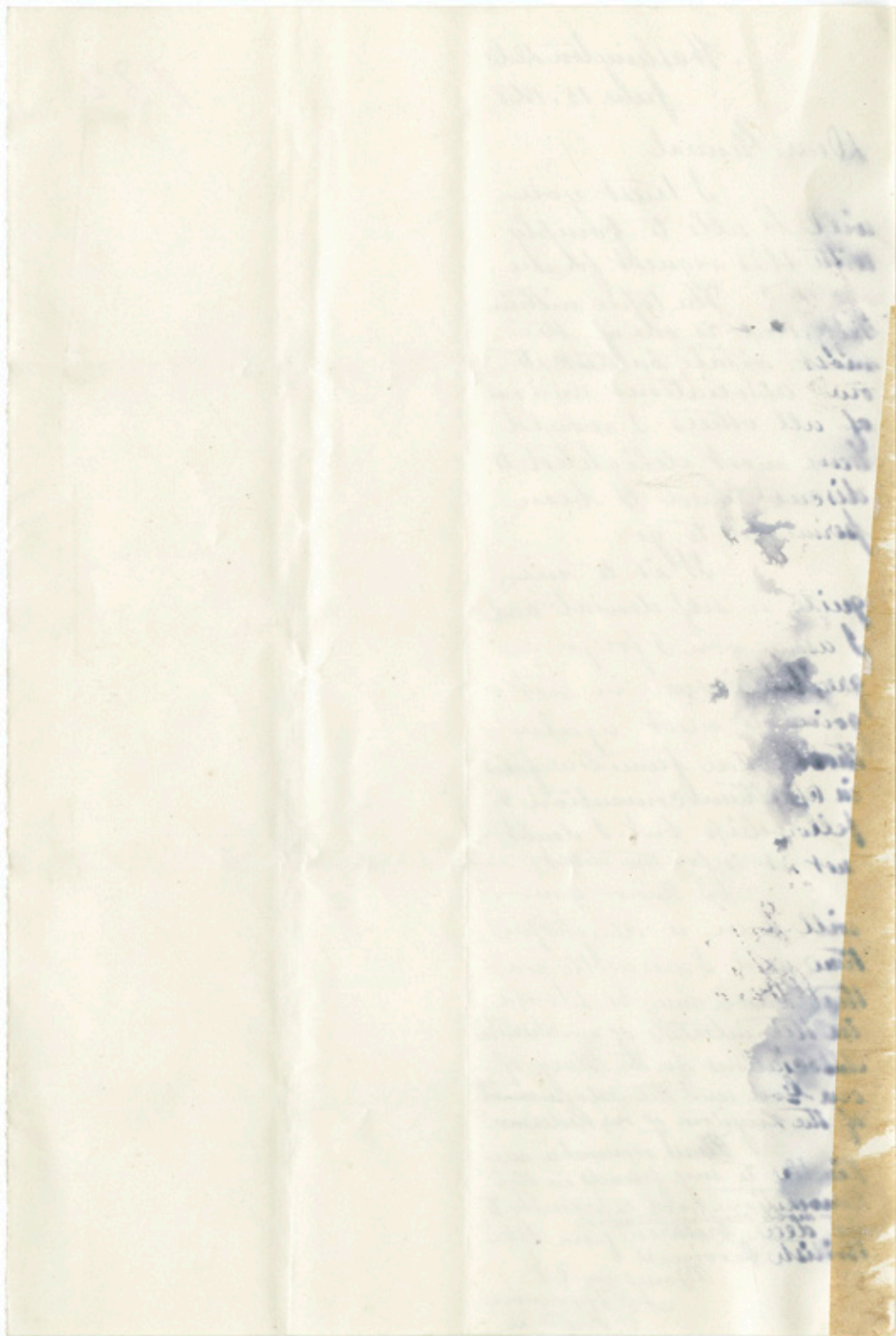
It is to me

Dear Brethren:

This Church
voted unanimously to com-
ply with your invitation to
attend a Council on the 17th
inst. and appointed a del-
egate accordingly: - but on
learning the course proposed
to be taken by most or all
of the other Churches invited,
that vote was reconsidered

Recognizing the
right of a minority to call
an ex parte Council, and

holding ourselves in readiness to comply with their request, we yet perceive in common with yourselves, how greatly it is to be desired that in case of difficulty in a Church the parties should agree to unite in calling for advice and assistance —

We will therefore co-operate with the sister Churches named in your letter, by sending to the majority an earnest appeal for their union with you in summoning at once a Mutual Council —

Should this appeal not succeed — as we greatly hope it may — we shall reckon it a plain duty to

accede to your request if
repeated -
