D^r Sir

Among the enclosed papers, please find our recommendation (as suggested by you) should you think the signatures insufficient, we can procure many more, the character of those gentlemen who kindly favored our views, encouraged us to believe more names superfluous. Uncle (Mr. Isaac Clark) I take the liberty to address you in
reference to my own personal interest. He requested me to state
what I had done for the benefit of the freed people but as
you are well informed in all events touching their welfare
and know who have been their friends and what has been ac-
complished in their behalf either educational or otherwise and
by whom; it would ill become ^{me or any other} ~~any~~ person to endeavor to instruct
you in such matters; for this reason and because I doubt the
propriety of persons heralding their own meritorious services even if they
are entitled to any praise for their actions I shall merely
submit ^{to} you my present pecuniary condition feeling confident that
you will ^{do} whatever you will think is ^{right} ~~just~~ and consistent with
your convictions of justice. You are doubtless aware that during the
past two years my salary has been quite small not sufficient at
many times to meet the actual necessities of my family so that
I have been unable to lay aside anything to support them while
even temporarily out of employment, and permit me here to state

what you will doubtless admit to be the fact, that ~~it is~~
is but little hope of persons occupying my position politically obtaining
many favors in most of the Depts. of the Genl. Govt. therefore, ~~it is~~
that it is that ^{we look to and other legal sources} you to sustain us as far as the public interest will allow
in the way of employment &c. During the past and present months
I have secured temporary employment for about fifty colored men
upon the streets. Believing that you will act in any case according
your high convictions of right I submit it entirely to you not wishing
to force you to act contrary to your own inclinations
