My Dear Will:



Institution.



Dear Genl

You will

see by the Arizona Miner of this date accounts of Indian Raids made on the Ranch of Mr Rogers near Camp Verde, and one made within two miles of Ft Whipple. I am advised by Mr Bostford that the account of the driving off of the Sheep & the murder of the man who was herding them contained in the paper is in all respects correct. I am glad however to be able to inform you that (as is understood here upon information deemed reliable) nearly the whole flock of Sheep have been recovered - they were overtaken at a distance of about sixty miles from this place in a direct line, the pursuing party having rode fully an hundred miles in reaching them. It is said that not more than one or two hundred of the Sheep will be lost to the owners. So far as we know the Indians have

escaped. The recovery of this property  
as I am informed by Mr Bushnell  
& others is due to the energy & prompt-  
ness of Capt Nakamura & Lieut Boyle  
& the men under them in this ex-  
pedition - As you will see to hear of  
the said our people were desirous  
you should also learn of the recovery  
of the property and the great ser-  
vices rendered by these officers and  
the men of their Command - I send  
this to Arizona City hoping it may  
reach you before you leave the Ter-  
ritory. The poor fellow who was mur-  
dered there was horribly disfigured  
shot through both arms & his head  
both literally crushed with stones -  
He is said to have been a man of edu-  
cation and culture - was here without  
means and like many other good  
men lost his life here in striving  
by honest and earnest labor to make  
a start in life - We believe sent that  
you visit to this Territory will hasten  
the time when our people may pursue  
peaceful labors in safety - There are  
no words spoken of you by any class  
of our people other than words of respect

a speech was never made even might  
be properly used to describe the  
feelings of our people towards you or  
They speak as men in pain do when  
they have found an appreciative  
friend in one who has the ability  
to afford them protection and relief




