TWELFTH TOAST.

The Sanitary Commission-Response by

Gen. O. O. HOWARD.

General Howard wondered upon what hypothesis the Sanitary Commission had been assigned to him; it looked like rearwork. The philosophy seemed to be that he had attended a peace convention, and had been called upon to make a speech, and had then said that he loved peace so well that he was willing, if necessity colled for it, to fight for it. He had also been notorious in the Army of the Potomac; he had always yoted for fighting. But he loved peace—a peace that would include all men, even the poor Indian. He made this statement in self-defense.

The Sanitary Commission was the ehodiment of the home feeling, and was sacredly dear to all our hearts. It furnished the soldiers with those thousand little home comforts which teld of loving hearts and warm. friends at home. The agents of the commission were the representatives of our horses and firesides. They ministered to the wants of those in the field and nursed the sick and dying in the hospitals. They were the true embodiment of the patriotism of the country. There is no such a thing as pure patriotism. In the last war we fought not for the country alone, but we fought for the liberty of our conscience, for equal rights to all men, for our homes and firesides, for the perpetuity of the Government. -that it might, as General Hurlburt had expressed it, live from age to age as a Republic, in which the men of all nations should find homes and firesides of their own.

A glowing tribute was paid to the noble men and women who had done so much for the soldiers' comfort, and concluded with a brilliant peroration as to the future of the
