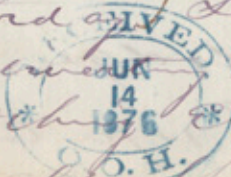

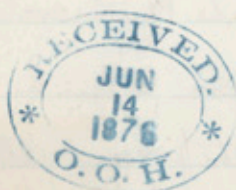
Dear General, I have today  
your letter of the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. 1<sup>st</sup>. In regard to General Sherman,  
He is kindly disposed toward you, and attentive, but he is  
wise enough to wait until he can effect something. He
