Most honorable O. O. Howard,

Your letter of June 10 was received. Some time ago, and have read it over and over again [sic]. Poor, Lee, and Leggens thought You was, Their Friend. They thought You would not leave not thing undone ore [sic] unsaid, but what you would helpe [sic] them. to go to their home, and They Talke [sic] Shamefully to Me, Saying that I was helping M., Wilbur, so I left there, and I dont [sic] know what to do, I havent [sic] got any Money, I have Spend all I had save up. and I thought if I get My people back to Malheur I would alwayes [sic] live with them, and make Me a home there, I dont [sic] think Wilbur did right by Me. if he had, <sup>[paged?]</sup> Me [?] the time I was there. it would helpe [sic] Me greate [sic], but he did not. I went there the 14<sup>th</sup> of May, left there 23<sup>rd</sup> of June. I will Send you the letter, which hon. C. Schuz give [sic] Me. You can reade [sic] [it?] and send it back to Me. I will Stay here till I hear from, C Schuz, Give My kindest regards to your Wife and Babys [sic]. Your humble Servent,
