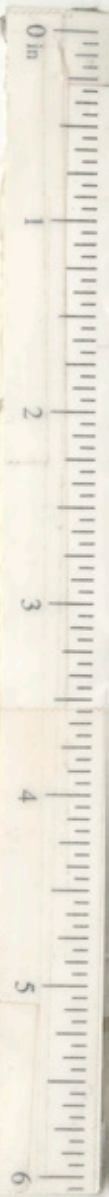

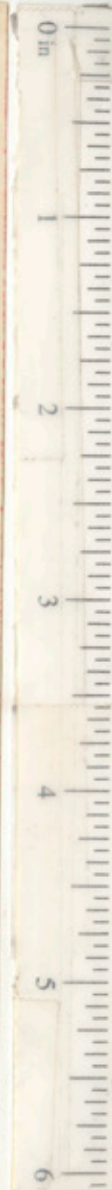

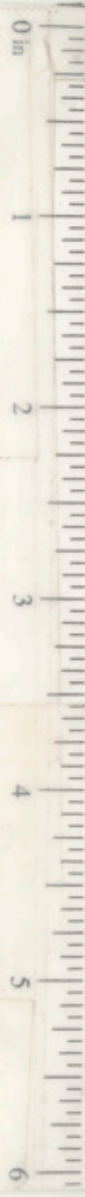
Rejoice to inform you that
