Washington, D. 8., May 14, 1881. General O. O. Howard: Dear Sir: You will doubtless remem= her the writer as a laborer among the Friedmen, in Augusta, Leorgia, about 1871=3. We met, then, in presence of Rev. Dr. Limmours, of New Jok, afterwards Vice President Wilson, I. W. Alvord, and others. I took the work at Augusta under the Congregational and Baptist Mission Boards. I am now here in the interests of educotion for the masses in the South, - the poor Whites, among others, for whom nobody, seems to care. I am in accasional conference with Judge Tourque; author of "Fool's Errand" and others who are deeply interested in this work. Ex-Lecretary Robeson proposes getting me a temporary appointment, from President Far= field, where I can work up to the Educational work as it developes. And we hope for favorable legislation next winter. Mr. Roberon told

me yesterday, ( as I mentioned your name among others who knew me as a loborer among Freedmeny that a letter from you would be voluable to me just now. You will remember perhaps one marked feature of the work at Augusta, that I anceeded in getting an oppropriation from the (aptly named) Poor School Fund of that city, for our colored Thools. And you will perhaps remember my small work, a copy of which was sent you containing Whittier's Paem, "Howard at Atlanta," ="Tell'em we are rising, "etc. I detail there circumstances thus because that several years have elapsed, - years which have been full of other work and other scenes to us all.
