will be possible for you to
stay? I finish here May 1st &
then the custom is to give the
officers relieved a month's delay
before requiring them to report
at their stations. This of course

can be used to keep me from being
put on half pay if I have to go
on leave to go with you & remain
longer than the time due me. I
shall go home Christmas for a few
days. Grace has just sent me a
picture of her baby who in
the photograph seems to take a very

Dear father

I have just read Genl.
Sherman's report and am
glad he refers so pointedly
to the Board of Visitors report
though I regret that he goes
out of his way to slur
at the Engineers, even though
there is a great deal of truth in
what he says; for during the
war no Engineer that I
remember made a good
aggressive General. Mother
did not write when she
was going to Maine but I
imagine she has gone by
this time. I hope Henry
succeeds very well with his

examination. Mother wrote
of a conversation between you
and Major Farley from which
she advises me to think no more
about the Ordnance & not to try
again. After the appointment
was made to the vacancy ~~to~~ which
existed at the time of my examination
I have thought no more about it.
At the time I went before the Board
I thought I would be as desirable
an officer as any that was then
ordered, to that corps & that the
examination under the law was
to be "as to fitness" & not competitive.
I think the Board reported just
as to fitness only & at least two members
did not wish to recommend anyone
by name. The papers were returned
^{the papers of}
Mr. Medcalf's examination, ~~papers~~
^{were sent to it}
previously held, & he was recommended.
I do not think the appointment
within the two years study it
would be necessary for me to

undergo to review all studies
of my life to make me certain
in a competitive examination
with competitors more recently
from school & who have
continually worked for this
end. I can find much more
useful employment for
my time on new studies which
will be useful to me in any
position in which I may be
placed. At that time, as now,
an Ordnance appointment to me
was only the promotion of one
grade - I did not particularly
desire the work. I wrote of it
now to correct the impression
mother gave that you thought
I still sought after a probably
unattainable end. It at the time
merely appeared possible & I did not
wish to lose any possibility of advancement
by the lack of trying on my part.


When I commenced work for
