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
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

Dear General:

With this mail I send you a copy of the Military Academy Bill. I regret that the Committee did not insert the appropriations you recommended, and which are unquestionably necessary to promote the general efficiency and welfare of the Academy. I do not, however, despair of accomplishing something in this direction when the bill reaches the Senate side of the Capitol.

It was deemed unnecessary to insert the section I explained to you relating to appointments to the army from civil life to the exclusion of graduates. The Committee thought that the 2<sup>d</sup> section

of the act of June 11, 1878, and the 3<sup>d</sup> sect.  
of act of June 18, 1878, abundantly protect  
graduates. When the bill comes up in  
the House for discussion efforts will

cussion will ensue which I believe  
will be of material assistance in the  
Senate, when the bill goes over there.




I have read Uncle Charles's letter with a great deal of pleasure & have written him a long letter. I did not write him so, but he had better remain there a year, during the making of contracts or receiving supplies etc., before he makes any recommendations. Of course the Indians should not be moved & only in time can become self supporting if scattered from their huddled condition at the Agency Buildings; which no one dares to try with the few troops but which will do itself if the Reservation is preserved to them. The Mexican Border across a Railway is far enough off. Citizens have taken up

all the country north of the Reserve.  
After Mule Charlie gets used to the  
Arizona frontier he will give his  
sight to "all kinds of stories." I  
don't believe the Enoska Springs story  
unless the Indians were so few that  
two companies were enough or there  
was some other reason. Grand Justice  
is a fine term but cannot pertain  
to camping troops in places of convenient  
crossing, on account of the time of trouble. I  
wrote him asking him to do away from  
the start with the idea that camps  
or forts could have any influence on Indian  
movements except as far as to make  
one section of country preferable to another  
for depredations if they expect to remain  
there till winter out. For omniscience, expense  
& supply fewer posts would be better.
