EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE OF SOUTHERN NEBRASKA.

Our state is very new, but rapidly developing, and the temptations to become forgetful of God are very great. Faithful pastors mourn that they do not see more results of their labors; while self-forgetting Sunday school teachers and Christian workers are alarmed at the smallness of the number of actual converts to Christ.

EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEES

are being owned of God in a signal way, and it is believed that as assistance to pastors, incentive to workers, and an open door to the great numbers who are not pronounced in His service, that such a committee should be formed with head-quarters at Lincoln.

The committee's work, in few words, is, organized personal work for Christ. Harlan Page on his death-bed spoke of a list of more than one hundred that he had good reason to believe had been converted by his personal efforts. "I will act as though I were the only one to act, waiting no longer for others," was the covenant he had taken, and all who knew him believed he had lived it.

For the most of the year past a series of evangelistic services of a week in a place have been going forward, and suffered for the lack of a committee to open doors and prepare the way, and more especially to follow up the effort. An effort of this kind has appointments to March 3, and invitations are in hand to run through March. The committee in the immediate future will do all that they can to follow up the week of evangelistic effort by going themselves as ministers or workers for a week or such time as they can command, and by securing others to take part in a service so promising. In each county where a week of evangelistic service is rendered, it is proposed to pass a week, one day in a place, in Sunday school work, during the months of May, June, September, and October. This committee enter upon their work with a deep sense of their own needs of power from on high, and a much greater insight and love for the sword of the spirit, which is the word of God.

Bro. K. A. Burnell, of Chicago, has been long engaged in evangelistic labor, and been eminently successful in it. The committee welcome him most cordially to the State of Nebraska.

He has already visited Red Cloud, Riverton, Bloomington, Republican City, and Alma.

The systematic and faithful preaching of the gospel in the open air at the street corner is in its infancy as a method of doing good. Have you faith in it? Will you take it up? If you can not sing or speak you can be present in silent prayer, and having done all, you can stand.
