My wife and children who are now in the east are on the point of joining ~~me~~ ~~her~~ her but to-day a report comes to ~~me~~ that the Companies of the 7th Regt now at this post are only temporarily located here for the winter and that in the spring there will be a change - My object in writing you is to ascertain if there is any reliance to be placed on this rumor as in case it is true I will let my family remain where they are for the winter and they can join me in the spring after the change is made - Mrs Bonham will thus avoid the trouble and worry of a darker moon and I desire to save her from it if possible as our

children are very young, the youngest
only a few months old, and she will
be so much better off when she moves
in this winter as in London than
have the quarters will I fear be
cold and uncomfortable for her &
the little ones.

I trust you will pardon me
for addressing you on this matter.
I assure you I do it entirely in
the interests of my family and to
save them from as much discomfort
as possible.

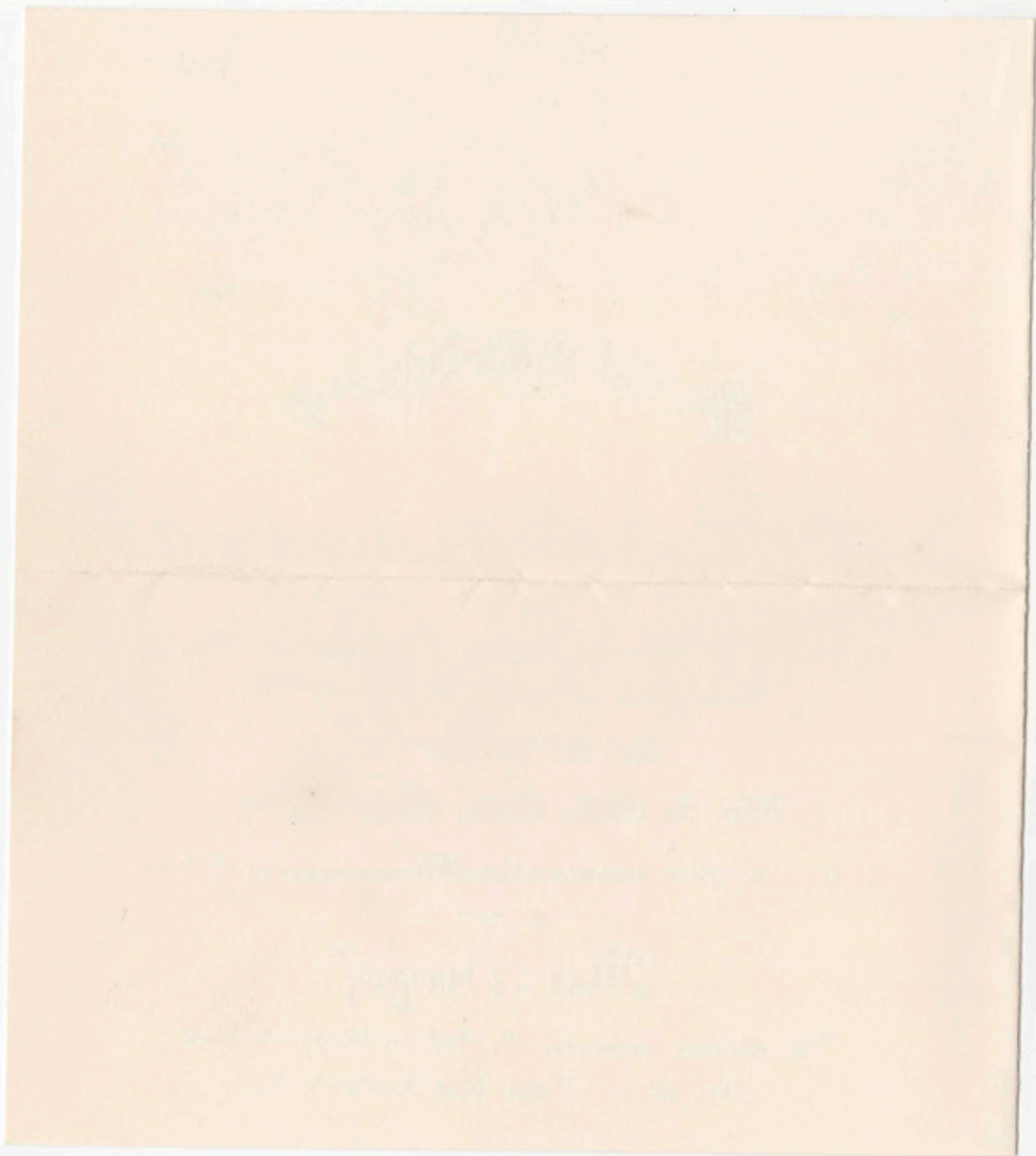
