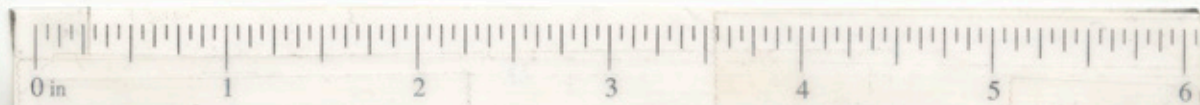

your sympathy and help.

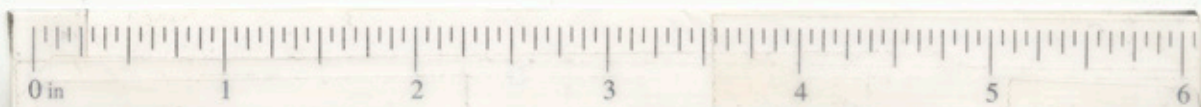

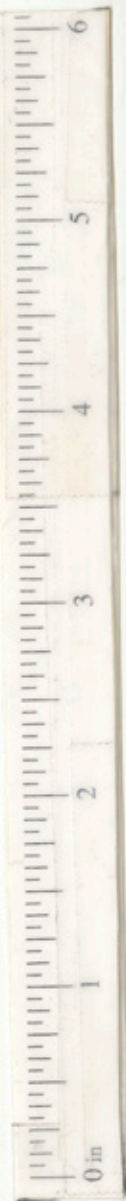
My dear General.

Dear Commander.

I was in much doubt, as I lived here at this  
Depot, whether it was my duty to send my  
official letter, asking for a transfer, to the  
Commander of Fort D. A. Russell, or not. But as my  
duties were there, I deemed it right and sent  
it to him for his action. He will forward it  
to you to day. I do not know what will be his  
endorsement. I know he is very peculiar in  
his views about Chaplains, but trust he will be  
both just and generous. I had supposed that  
I could endure anything that any man could endure,  
but I find I am mistaken in regard to an extremely  
cold climate. My constitution has succumbed; and  
I have been greatly embarrassed to ask this favor.



of my Commanders, and at the hands of my Country.  
I know from twelve years experience, that I can  
endure as much hard work in a hot climate,  
as almost any living man. —————

I will forward you, with this letter, a copy of  
the official letter to the Adjutant General; and  
if, as a Department matter, it need not be  
endorsed at the Fort, then you can endorse  
and recommend my transfer as you may  
deem best, on this one, and destroy the other.

Cal Anderson, would not tell me whether he  
would endorse the letter or not — or what kind  
of comments he would put upon it. But, general,  
he is not a Christian, and you are — Your name  
and influence in all the Churches, is "like precious  
ointment, poured forth". If therefore, he should  
put anything upon the letter that in your judgment  
would embarrass the case, or prejudice me,  
I beg you withhold it altogether. —————

I will only add, that I regret most profoundly,  
that I have found it necessary to trouble you  
in the least. If you will aid me in getting a  
transfer to the South, I will never cease to thank  
you, and in every possible way, to the end of my  
life, make every return in my power.

May the great Father, without whom "not a sparrow  
falls," and who "numbers the very hairs of our heads",  
bless, prosper and keep you & yours.

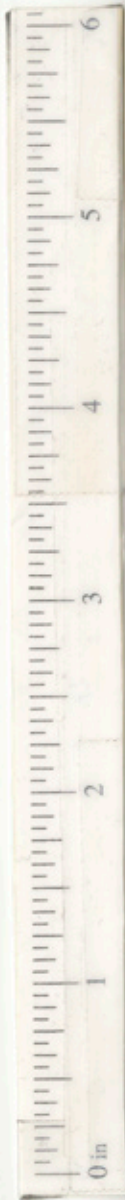

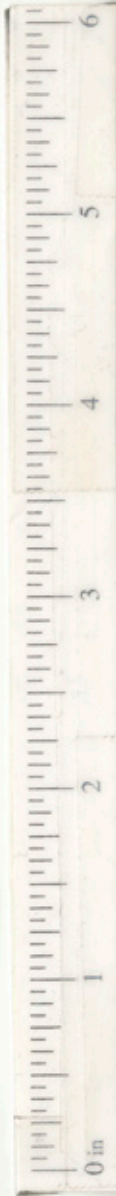
