Dear Father:

I have just returned from N.Y. I left here Tuesday (evening) afternoon. Dr. Knapp was not in. I staid over night with Peter Gilsey & called the next morning at 11 o'clock. The parlor was full & I had to remain until nearly two o'clock. It was then too late to make a thorough examination. He looked at them & said that there was no sign of an abscess. The trouble with them is in the construction of the eye itself. It is weak or rather has become so & if at-

tention is not given the
sight will soon fail. He
wanted me to come some
morning about 8 o'clock
& he would give me a
thorough examination. He
charged me nothing. I
shall (have) continue my
studies and shall not go
again until I hear from
you in answer to this letter
& not the last letter. I am
wearing a pair of Harry's
smoked glasses. My eyes
ache yet, in spite of the rest
they have had: Saturday, Sun.,
Mon., & Tuesday. My head has
ached almost constantly for
about a week. It is much
better tonight. Mr. Cobb sus-
pects that this will interfere
with my going to Bowdoin.

I told him this evening that I hoped not for I had not given up the idea yet. The doctor says that my eyes should have rest before examination.

I shall be a little easy upon my extra studies for a short time or until I hear from you.

Fort Douglas Hotel -
April 11th 1883

Dear father: I made a very
pleasant trip to Cheyenne
with Major & Mrs. Sawyer for
company and remained one
night there. Major and Mrs.
Lord were very well & every-
thing running smoothly.
People have teased the Major
a good deal about the
chaplain but the latter
is learning to keep within
bounds. I then went
to Fort Hall and found them
pretty well broken up. I
left there Monday afternoon
and met General McCook
at Ogden & came here with
him. I told him you were

going to send Major Knell
and two or four companies
to Thompson. He says
that he thinks it better
not to send the same
companies back, that
the company at Washakie
if available ought to go,
having been eight years &
more at Adlers. since 69.
Possibly two companies
will be all that are necessary
for a guard while the Port
is being built. Genl. M. Cook
also thinks that the Denver
and Rio Grande being finished
to this point from Denver
may modify the location
of the Port, especially

as that road opens up a
good deal of the Green River
Basin south of the Thornburgh
district. I will leave for
Cameron this afternoon and
then return here. After that
as I have a pass I will
go by the Denver and Rio
Grande Road to Denver &
home that way. Captain
Hamlin^{de} says the best way for
troops to go to Thornburgh is
for them to march from
this point. It would take
ten or eleven days. Next to
this he recommends the route
from Green River on the
Union Pacific. But this latter
route he recommends to
you to take if you again go

down into that country
The Thompson Companies wanted
be "C" and "I" if two went. Next
"E" now at Brachakie should go
and "K" now here. If "E" is
not available "A" ought to go next.
This leaves the Thompson Companies
out, that is, those that have been
already there. We are having
pretty stormy weather
with a little light snow
which melts as soon as it
falls. General McCook wishes
to be remembered to you and
to mother, as well as to Col.
Mearns & Ap. Bladen. Hoping
you are all very well &
with much love to all
