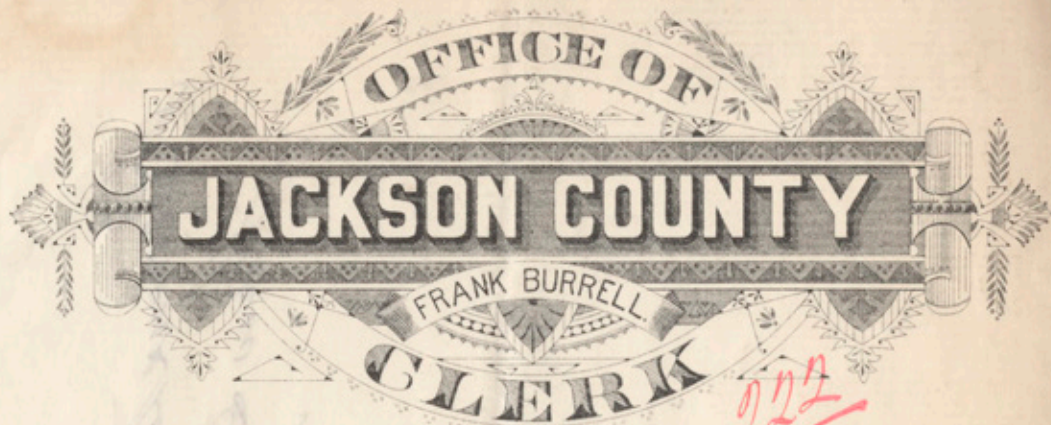
22/ Our new Chapel
