Left on October. She will go

my sister's in Virginia. To  
enable me to arrange these  
matters satisfactorily I will  
take a 20 days leave or you  
can grant me 10 days delay  
if you will in joining my  
new post.

The roads have been  
worse than kind. The U R  
R R has placed a box car  
at my service for my  
goods and a flat car for my  
wagons. Sept. Bickensdorfer  
has kindly placed his private

car at my service and it will  
be at Aurora (our nearest station)  
on the Oregon Short Line) tomorrow  
morning. We did not intend  
to start until Friday but I do  
not like to keep Mr Bickensdorfer  
car waiting. We will not take it  
further than Granger or Cheyenne  
anyway I think.

Mr Dewey has engaged  
rooms for us at the Millard  
and Mr Ben Gallagher at the  
Paxton. I think we shall go to  
the Paxton. Mrs Brisbin is not  
well and I wish her to stay quiet  
at Omaha until I get home last  
and my house fixed at Stobiana.




