A public meeting organized by himself in behalf of his cause was held in the Lincoln Mission Chapel in this City, on Friday evening, July the 24th, at which the Rev. Dr. Pitzer, Pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church of Washington and Professor in the Theological Department of Howard University, presided, and Rev. Dr. Sunderland, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church made an address at this meeting. Mr. Mitchell presented the nature of his work, what has been already done, what are the future designs and necessities. RANKIN RICHARDS INTSITUTE.

The attention of friends of the meritorious work of education is respectfully invited to the fact of the statement of the immediate need of means to establish the work of the above-namad institute, and to erect sufficient buildings for the same. The present demand is three thousand, five-hundred dollars (3,500) to be used in the erection of two school buildings; one for the school house, and one to be used for boys and young men to room in. This Institute will indeed be the most hopeful and one whose location is essentially adapted to the necessities of the aspiring youth.
