

My dear General.

I do not know what your interest is in Sabbath desecration in the army nor whether the assembling of a board to revise the Regulations can be considered a special opportunity for pressing the question, but my individual efforts have been so futile that it would be interesting to know if there are others who have spoken or will unite for any change in this matter. Of course confessed Christians are expected to be in the minority and it is only as a Christian one protests against military duty (which is the soldier's work) being prescribed for Sunday <sup>duties</sup> that is prescribed for no other day, and others being rather specially reserved for Sunday as conflicting them less with the mechanics and laborers work. I submit that Par. 1322, A. R. might wisely read as follows:

"Captains will inspect their companies  
every week. No soldier will be excused  
from the weekly inspection except the  
guard, the sick, and the necessary at-  
tendants in the hospital. And the company  
monthly report will indicate what men  
have missed the current weekly inspections  
and why they missed them."

But it is your views not an expression  
of mine that I desire. And there is another  
question evidently of morals, your words  
would have great weight in - the horrid  
bi-monthly orgies our unjustly tardy pay-  
ments lead the soldiers into, with the sad  
accompaniments of debt and desertions.

Hoping, General, you will let my  
interest and share of responsibility in these  
matters, which the religious and professional  
papers have been discussing, and my desire  
for information as to your attitude upon  
them be a sufficient excuse for taken up  
your time.

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
