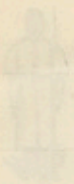

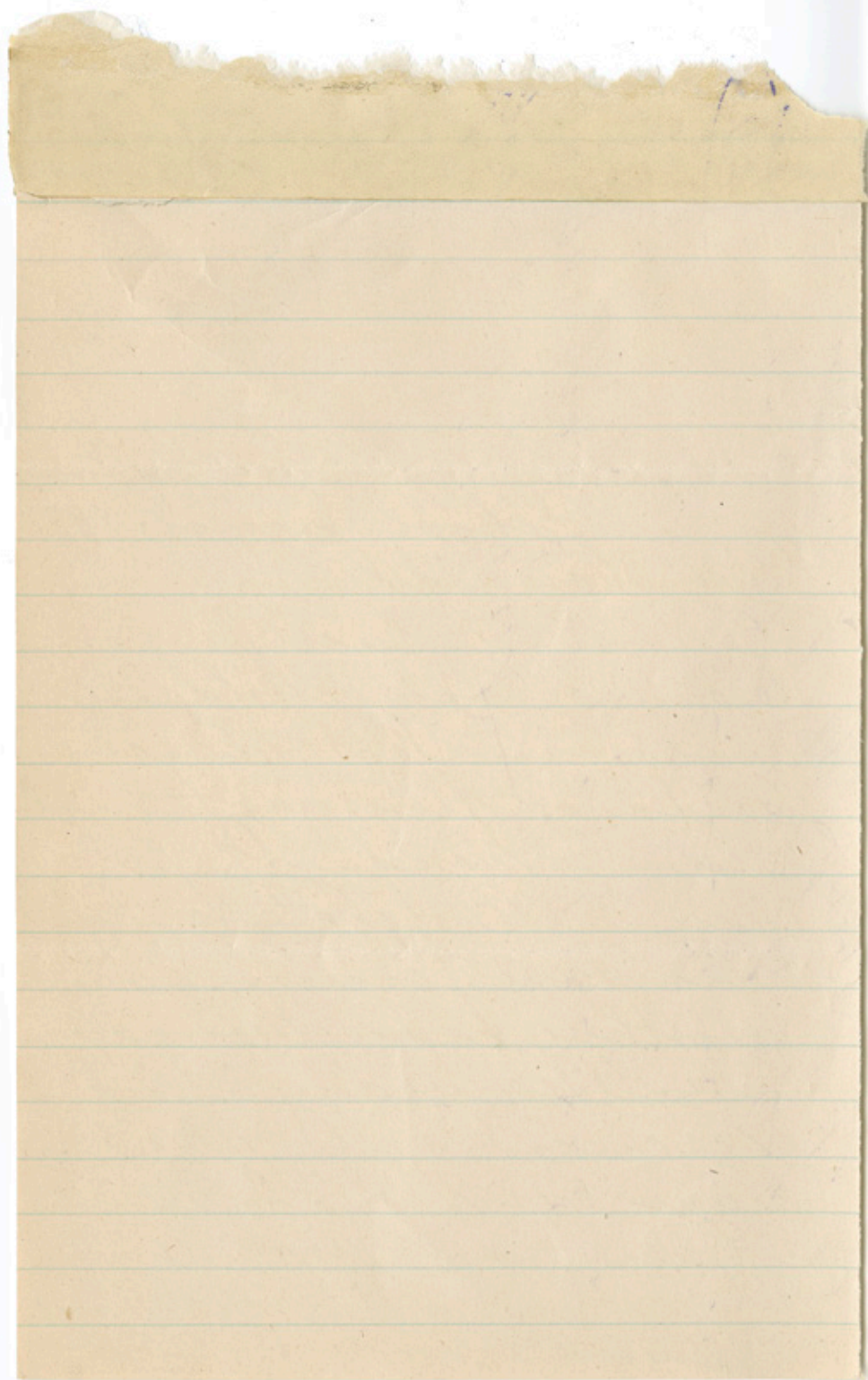

Dear General.

There is a current story here, that after Gen. Crook had thoroughly whipped the Indians in '72 or '73, that they wished to surrender, and promised, if permitted to return to the Reservation, that they would in the future behave themselves. Gen. Crook is reported to have said that he did not believe their promises, and made as a provision of the treaty, that 13 of the leading Indians, should be delivered to him, dead or alive. Some of them were brought in alive, but some refused to surrender and were killed, and as a proof of their death their heads were brought in. "Chappo", is reported to have brought the head of his Father, "Del-chay".

I know Chappo very well, and will

ask him about it in case he comes to
the Agency before my leaving.

Dr. Pangburn, Head Farmer, would
be likely to know about it, as would
also Al Siber, but both are tempo-
rarily absent.

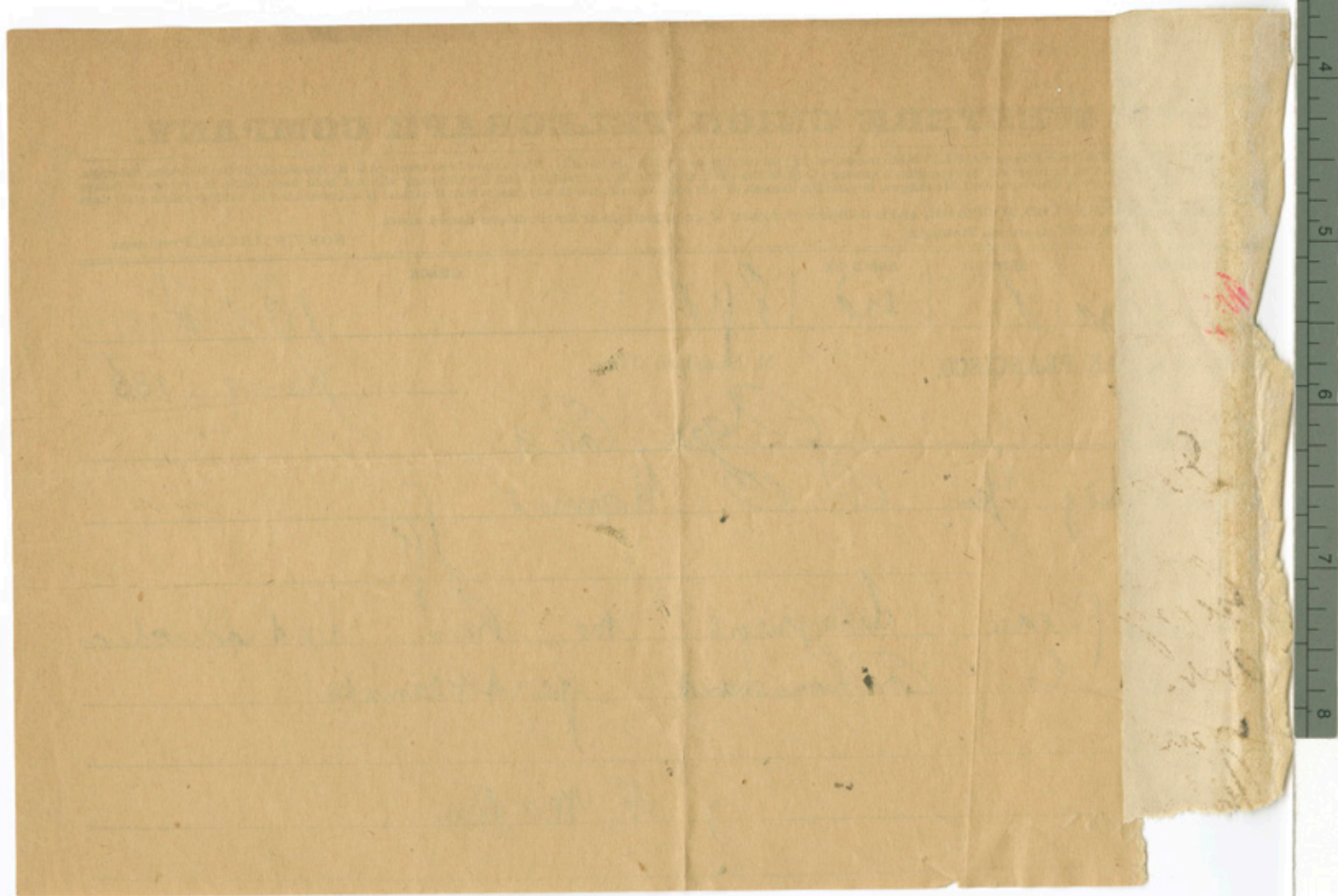
