

The object of the Associated Charities is not to check benevolence, but to prevent the pauperization of the people, and assist the public in directing their gifts into channels where they will do good instead of harm.

To effect this end the Society offers, free of charge, to investigate the cases of all applicants for relief who may appeal to our citizens, whether at their homes, at their offices or on the street; whether the application is made to an individual, a church society or a charitable institution.

Private citizens and officers of all charitable institutions are requested, for the good of humanity and the best interests of the community,

to give attention to the following points and suggestions:

First—Not to give any relief whatsoever at the door or on the street (except where the applicant is well-known and deserving) without first referring the applicant to the office of the Associated Charities for investigation; as otherwise idleness, deception and crime may be fostered, and charity directed from the honest poor.

Second—That when applicants present themselves at the office of the Society, or their names are sent in by responsible persons for investigation, their cases will be carefully inquired into without unnecessary delay.

Third—That if the person or institution sending the applicant desires to give relief (provided the case is entitled to relief), the Society will furnish a report of the case, with suggestions as to the kind and quantity of relief best adapted to the case.

Fourth—That after investigations have been made, aid only to be given in accordance with the suggestions of the Society.

Fifth—Individuals and officers of charitable

institutions are requested to report to this Society whatever relief is given; also to communicate any information that may be valuable with regard to particular cases.

Sixth—Cards or investigating tickets will be furnished to those desiring them, with the request that they be given to every applicant for relief, as that will insure the case being duly inquired into.

Seventh—That the investigation will be made free of charge, even if the sender is not a subscriber to the Society; although subscriptions are solicited to enable the Society to carry on its work.
