Dear General:

I have your letter of 7th instant. In my reply would say that the only authority I hold from you in the matter of your stock in the Y. M. C. A. was your proxy to represent the stock at the meeting of the stockholders. If you desire that I should look after the matter for you you can execute and return to me the enclosed power of attorney.

I find on inquiry that the status of the matter is about as follows: The Committee of the stockholders made an arrangement with Mr. Burgdorf to sell the property to Mr. Burgdorf acting for a syndicate. He was to pay \$10,000, cash, - the balance was to be deferred payments with interest at 6 per cent secured by deed of trust. The calculation

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made was that upon this basis the stockholders would receive about fifty three (53) cents on the dollar.

It is proposed to suggest to the stockholders, especially those who own a small amount of stock, that they sell the same for say, 50 cents on the dollar, if they desire to realize at once, in order that those who own large blocks of stocks may control the balance being able to wait.

As the \$10,000 has been paid the probability is that this arrangement will be perfected. I think however that it would be well to have the matter looked after here. I inclose a circular the prospectus of the new association which has been formed.
