a word of encouragement.

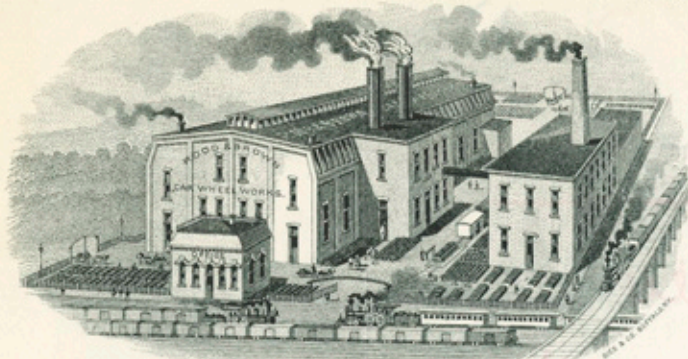
