My Dear General.

Your kind note of the 1st inst. enclosing a letter to the Adjutant General in behalf of my son has been received. It was postmarked the 2^d and took six days to get here.

I thank you for the interest you have taken in the matter and for your good letter to the Adjutant General.

I understand fully all you tell me about the higher "powers that be" and I sympathize fully with what must be a natural feeling of resentment against the little politicians, aping statesmen, who use their brief authority to

humiliate better and greater men than themselves. 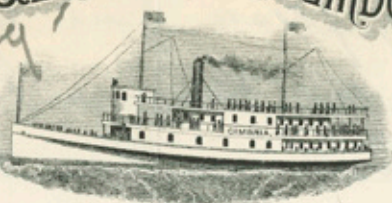
