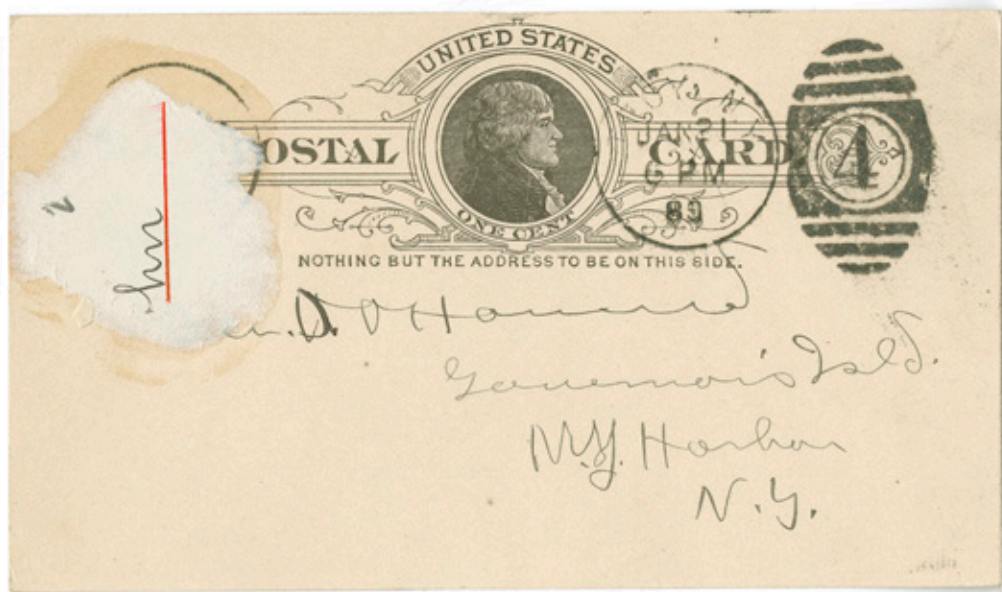

Dear General:

I have your favor of 18<sup>th</sup> instant and in reply would say that the case of the United States vs. Watson now on appeal from the Court of Claims to the Supreme Court of the United States and which is supposed to involve the question as to longevity pay under the Acts of 1838 and 1870 has not yet been decided by the Supreme Court. I am thoroughly familiar with this case and if the Court decided as it appears to me they must, the amount found due Watson must be simply the amount which he could have recovered at any time by application to the Accounting Officers of the Treasury under the Tyler and Morton decisions. I believe that the counsel in this case (H. W. Warden) perfectly well understood that he had no case outside of the decisions named for the reasons



that the Court of Claims sustained demurrer on the statute of limitation which cut out for consideration everything which had accrued prior to six years from date of filing petition. However it is pretty hard work to tell how any Court will decide any question until after they have done so.

I have a case in connection with Mr. W. J. Moberley attorney of this City which is now pending in the Court of Claims in which the right to longevity increase under the Acts of 1838 and 1870 can be considered, where the statute of limitations will not apply, and it is the only case known to me which can be considered a test case on these points.

I will bear in mind what you say as to the heirs of Lt. Greble in anything that may occur.

Mr. Pratt tells me that he has sent you check for the amount due on Y. M. C. A. stock. Thanks for your kind suggestion as to stock held by the gentleman you name. I presume however that they have all been represented in the matter long ere this

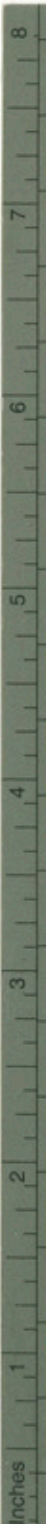

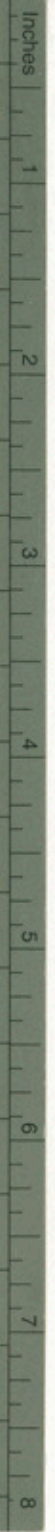
Dear Brother:-
