possible, and even
his is no argument
at-all. Your reply
is conclusive, and fatal
to his aspirations.
His dismissal

from the Army in 1861
by the Sec. of War
may have been tech-
nically a sketch of
authority, but it was
confirmed and adopted
by the President, in nomi-
nating his successor.

The dismissal to
the offending officer was
the result in many
cases, of voluntary res-
ignation by an officer
sympathizing with, or
intending to join, the

rebellious; and was very
probably authorized by
the President. However
that may be, the con-
firmation of his succes-
sor absolutely and ir-
revocably terminated
his connection with
the army, and made
him a citizen from
that date. His claims
of successive promo-
tion are therefore
baseless, and seem
to spring from a chi-
cumb imagination.

as I look at the
question, Geo. Triggs,
if he were living, might
with equal right claim
to be entitled to
be in Geo. Schfield's
place. Col. Webster
also, which he does
not deny writing, was
probably in the Secre-
tary's hands when he
ordered the dismissal.

For me to make
an argument in favor of
this claim would be to
show impossibility.

It seems to me not
improbable that any
encouragement given
Col. W. to hope for
success, may result
in confinement some-
times.

Your kind favor of the 18th inst. in
answer to my letter to Genl. Howard
has been received; In reply I will
say that I am very thankful to the Genl.
for offering to assist me in procuring a
commutation from the Soldier's home at
Washington D.C. I am receiving \$8.
per month from that institution now, this
I obtained through the assistance of
Genl. R. C. Quinn adjt. Genl. U.S.A. the
Genl. knows me, having served under him
over

when he was a Lieut. in the 4th
U.S. arty. in 1851+2. but Lieut
I ask you Sir, what is \$8 per month
for a family to live on? however it
helps. I thought that the Genl.
was also acquainted with some of the
Engineer Officers on this coast, who
employ a good many men, and have
various positions to bestow, where a
kind word from ^{the} Genl. would go
farther than my asking for a month.
I find that some of the Engineer officers
are not very partial to men who have
spent their best days in the army,
for instance, four years ago I applied
to Lieut. Willard Young (now Capt) for a
position, and succeeded only through the
intercession of Col. H. A. Morrow 21st
Infly. when I offered my record and
Soldier to Lieut. Young, he gave me to
understand that he cared nothing for
that, nor for a man who had served

ever so long (very encouraging wasn't it).
I held the position until the annual
appropriation ran out, when I, as well
as others, were discharged. Since then
I have been trying again & again to get
back there, but have been unsuccessful
so far, however Officers have been changed
Lieut. Edward Bull is now in the immediate
charge, and "Major" Handbury is in charge
of the whole, I have asked both of these
Gentlemen for a position, and told them
that I had served over twenty years in the
army, and that I think is the reason I
got left, sometimes I am thinking that I
must have committed a crime to serve
"Uncle Sam" as long as I did, or served
