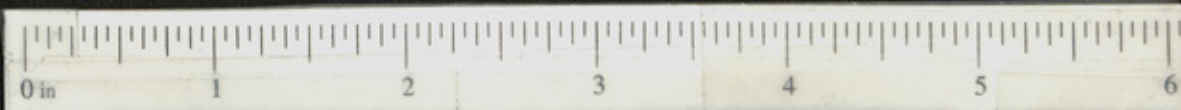
My dear General:

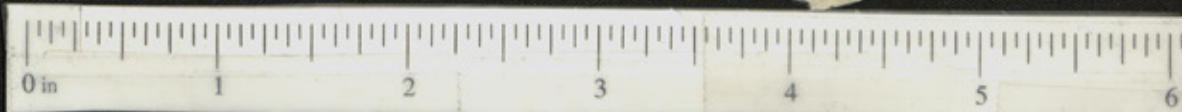
Dear General Howard:
