

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 16, '89.

My Dear General:

You will remember that during the first session of the 50th Congress an appropriation of \$25,000 was made for the establishment of an Indian Industrial School in Ormsby County, Nevada.

At the last session of Congress I secured an additional appropriation of \$10,000 for the erection of buildings etc., for the school. We are now endeavoring to secure a competent superintendent of the institution, and in this connection I quote the following from a letter to me from MR. H. M. Yerington, of Carson City:

"On the 5th of April last year I wrote you that Genl. O. Q Howard had been here taking much interest in our Indian School, and told me to say to you that when the school was ready for it he would gladly detail an officer, an excellent man, well fitted for the position from his intercourse with Indians, to act as superintendent without expense to the Government, he being already under pay. Now, what do you think of the proposition? It strikes me as being a good idea and presume the General would see to it if called on."

If you could detail such a person as indicated by Mr. Yerington to act as superintendent of the Indian school, I think it would be of great benefit to the institution.

Please inform me whether you can do so, and let me know the name of the person you may select, whether he is married or not, etc., and greatly oblige,
