My Dear Howard:

Your letter of the 8th instant I got on Saturday. I was glad to hear from you. My recommendations and petitions were sent by Jewett to Frye. I guess they are in the best hands. Jewett did not go to Washington. He said he did not think it would do any good or prevent at least. Deane wrote to Cothren that if Frye and you and Jewett were in earnest in pushing me for the place I could not fail to get it. Yes, Frye has written me very cordially, unexpectedly so, and sent me at the same time a strong recommendation to the President.

You must write me a letter of Recommendation to the President and mail it to Frye, <sup>showing</sup> and if you can make it in your way to be at W. call on the President and Atty. Genl. and tell 'em you want me appointed and you may pledge me to make a good judge and I'll redeem the pledge - I'll make good your endorsement of me.

The three judges and all my old bar recommend me strongly. The bar here do. And the County An. Com. and the Phoenix of the Ter. Com. and many many of the Territorial
