Dear General:

I am afraid we have struck a snag in the matter of sale of your lot No. 12 in square 743. The purchaser had an examination of the title made. I inclose copy herewith. I have seen Mr. Francis H. Smith who says he will execute the deed. After a great deal of trouble I have seen Mr. Leopold who has the custody of the books of the F. L. & T. Company and we find that these books show that the note for \$400 was paid July 1, 1874. As the trustee is dead there is no possible way to clear your title except by going into Court, having the Court appoint a trustee with authority to execute the deed of release. Of course this expense must be borne by you. It would probably take thirty days or a little longer to accomplish it. I will have it done as



cheaply as possible but I await instructions from you before taking any further steps.

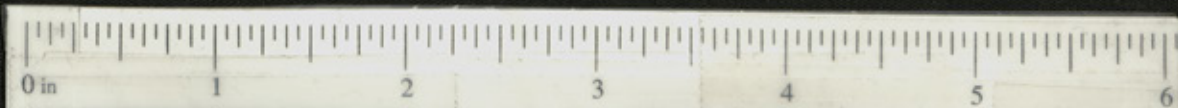

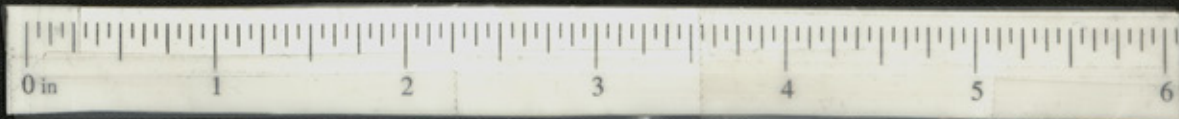
Dear General.

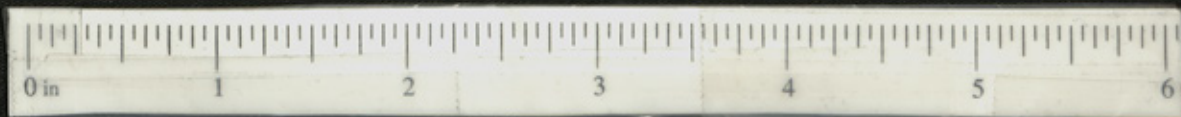

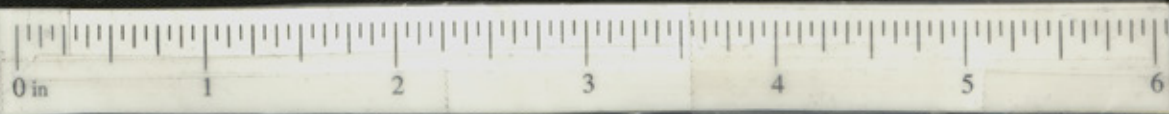

This fact ought to be considered and duly credited, but so far this portion of the state has been ignored by those who have assumed to manage the affairs of state in California.

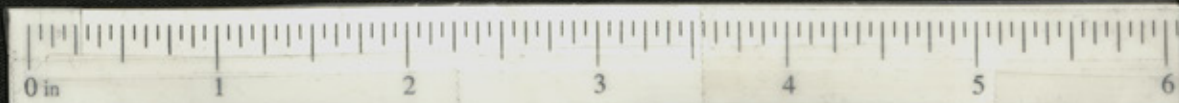
President Harrison could easily

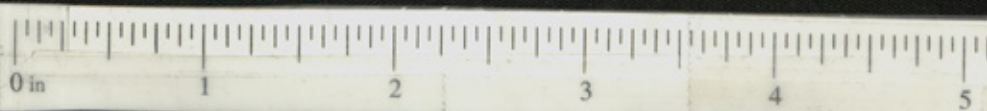

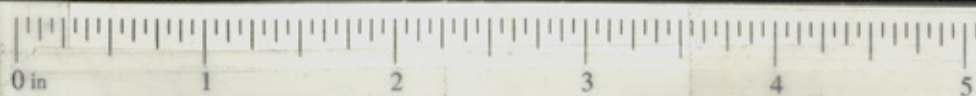

P.S. I neglected to say that the proceedings to clear the title will probably take if commenced immediately, about 90 days, and will cost about \$50. Mr. Wagner



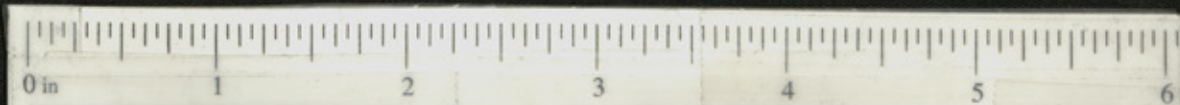

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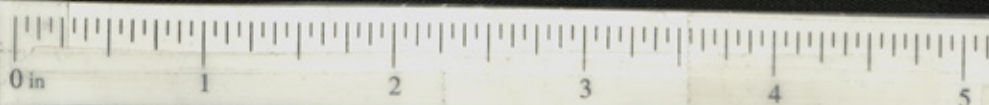
