United States Senate,

Washington, D. C., Dec. 22, 1889.

My dear Sir:-

Yours of December 17th has just been received. I have no personal acquaintance with Col. Morgan of whom you write, and have formed my opinion in regard to the propriety of his nomination from what I have read in his published statements as to the Indian question and his official report as Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

The respect I entertain for you personally and for the high position you hold makes it proper for me to write you frankly that I consider the views of Col. Morgan as to the education of the Indians so entirely chimerical and impracticable, that I cannot vote for his confirmation.

In religion I am a Protestant, and am not therefore influenced in the slightest degree by the fact that Col. Morgan is being opposed by the Catholic Church.

My opinion as to his fitness for the place to which he has been nominated is based entirely upon his published views, which are utterly inconsistent with my personal experience amongst the Indian Tribes.

The enclosed copy of a letter from Senator Vest to Bishop Tuttle shows the ground of Senator Vest's opposition to Gen. Morgan's plan. Senator Vest's statements are so vague that they would be unworthy of notice if it were not that he has a vote to cast in deciding this issue. I have taken what steps seemed open to me to meet Senator Vest's objections, and I think that it would further be of great use if you would communicate either with Senator Vest direct, or with Bishop Tuttle, stating your views of the practicability of Gen. Morgan's plan for Indian education, as the time is short which must elapse before this question is settled. I trust it may be convenient to you to act immediately. I write this letter upon the supposition that you are favorable to Gen. Morgan's proposed plan for extending the benefits of a practical Indian education to Indian youth.
