In answer to your kind letter of March 22<sup>nd</sup> in which  
you express a willingness to ask for my transfer to Mt.  
Vernon Bks, Ala, to labor among the Apache Indians.  
I wrote you March 24<sup>th</sup>, inclosing an application to the  
War Dept, asking to be transferred to Mt Vernon Bks, Ala.  
As nearly a month has passed, and I have heard  
nothing I fear my letter miscarried. Or, if my  
letter reached you perhaps I should not have inclosed  
a formal application, but have left it with you  
to request the Secy of War to make the transfer, especially  
as the Secy of War has recently taken the matter of the  
stationing of Chaplains into his own hands.

Of course, a letter from you to the Secy of War  
concerning this matter would be more likely to  
accomplish the desired result than any formal  
application of mine. I hope you will not con-  
sider me troublesome by writing you again on



This subject. And I know you will pardon me for so doing when I inform you that my whole heart and soul is in this work.

I am thoroughly anxious that some Chaplain should be sent to them, and if you know of any one else, who in your judgment, might be of more service to them than myself, let him be sent to them, and may our Heavenly Father give him success. If you think I could help them and will request the Secy of War to transfer me to them, I shall go to them willingly trusting in our Master for strength to lead them into a better and nobler way of living.

In the New York Christian Advocate, of April 10<sup>th</sup> I found the inclosed clipping. I liked it so much though I need send it to you. From the same number of the Advocate, I clipped the inclosed editorial, "A Cry from a noble tribe of Indians" which has made me still more anxious to go to the Apaches. Please kindly let me know whether the Secy of War consents to make the transfer or not.
