I think I am entitled to the succession by length of service, most of it directly with troops and fitness.

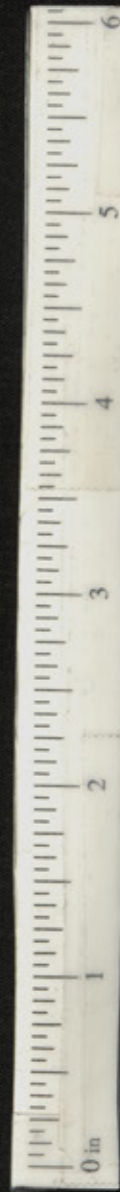
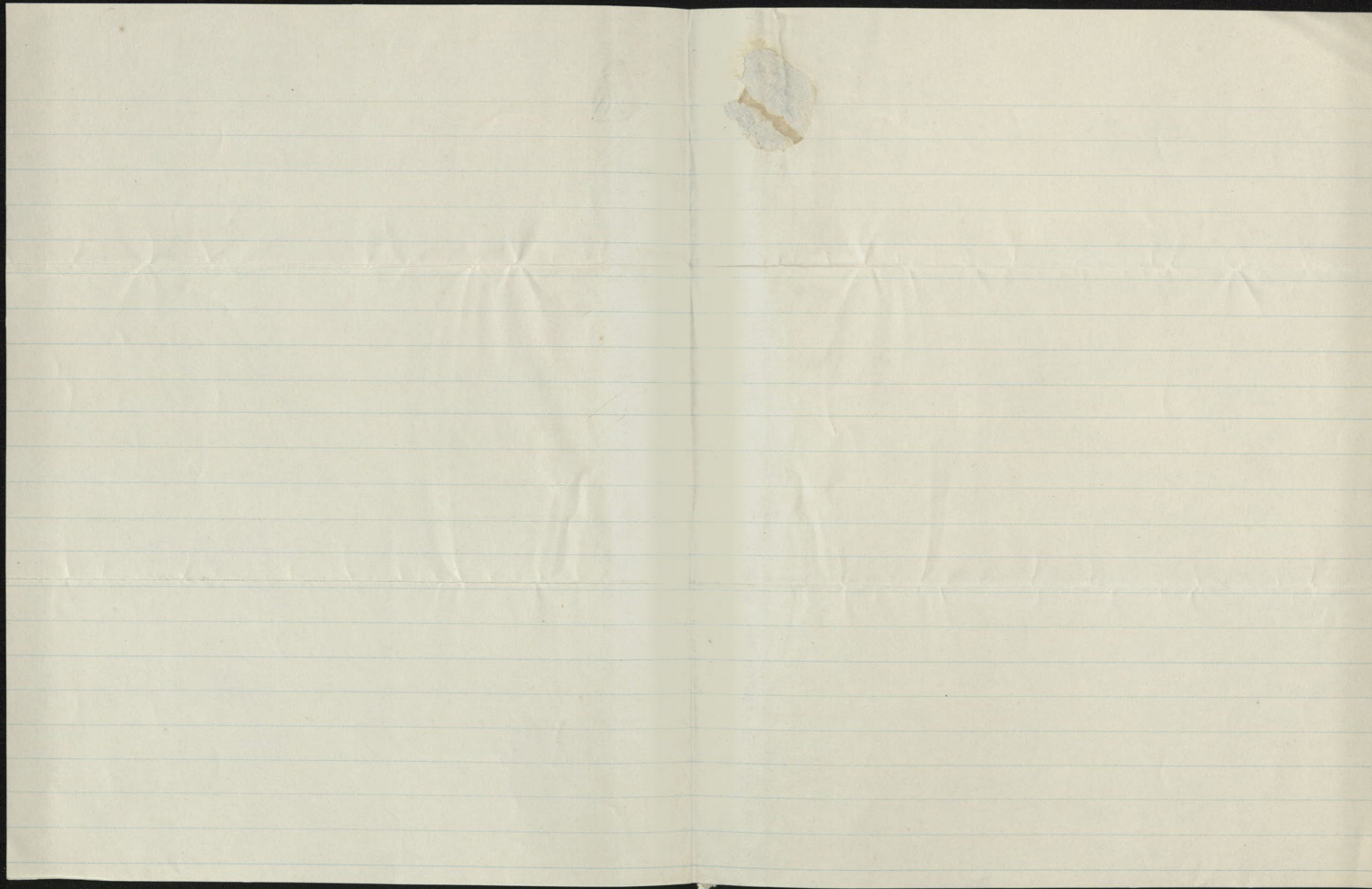
The enclosed records will exhibit my service as well as comparative service of the other medical officers next below the Surgeon General on the Register.

Our people think it almost indispensable that you come here on the night train from Portland.

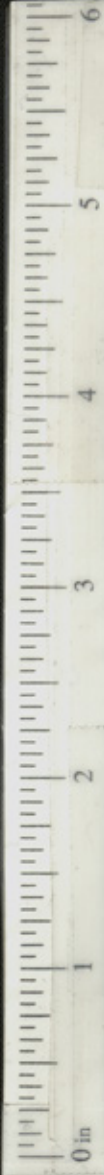

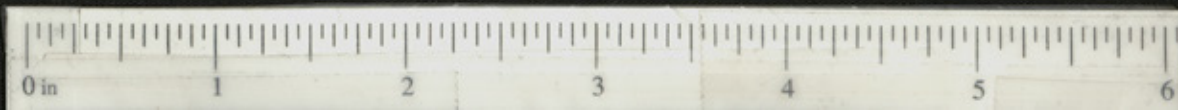

The party will not be large, probably under twelve, and will be under the leadership of one of our Officers.

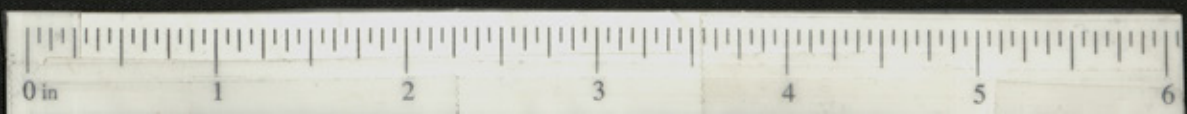
If you grant us permission would you kindly let me know at what time the Ferry leaves the Barge Office, after 2 o'clock.

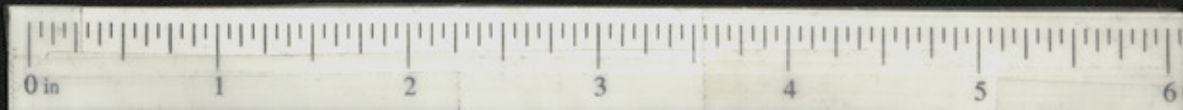

My dear Gen. Howard: -

At our Annual Meeting held in Cleveland in 1882, the closing evening service was occupied by addresses delivered by Dr. J. L. M. Cary, of Richmond, Va., Sec. of the Peabody Fund, Hon. Andrew D. White of Cornell University and Ex-Pres. Hayes. It was a grand meeting, and we wish to reproduce something of the same sort at our next Annual Meeting, to be held in Northampton, Mass., October 21-23. We propose to have four addresses to be delivered by yourself, Dr. Cary, Sec. Widom and Congressman Breckinridge of Kentucky. We suggest as the theme around which these addresses shall cluster: "The co-operation of the North and the South in the education and Christian advancement of the Negro." This topic does not touch on politics or legal questions, but embraces the broad range of the Negro's advancement; its possibilities, its progress, its hindrances, and, finally, the fitness for all reasons that the North and the South should frater-



nally and efficiently co-operate in this great work. We want you to give the closing address - one of your warm-hearted, earnest appeals that shall bring Christ and his gospel to the front. We earnestly hope that your convenience and your inclination will lead you to accept our invitation.

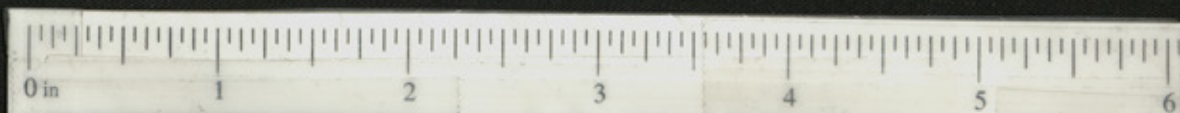
