As our worthy Commander has placed my name first on this committee, I have taken the liberty of making a rough draft of a set of resolutions upon the matter in hand, which I enclose.

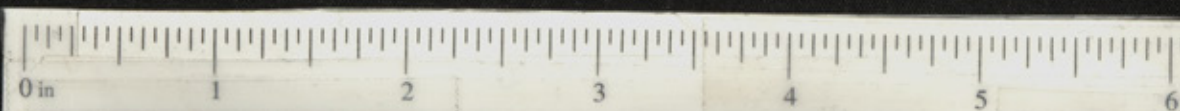

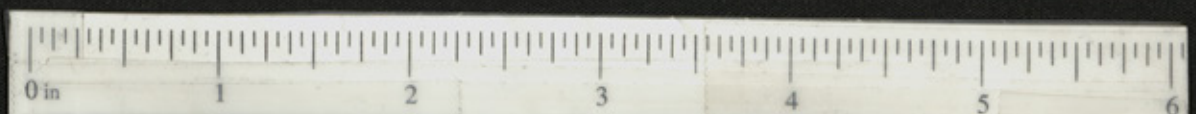
