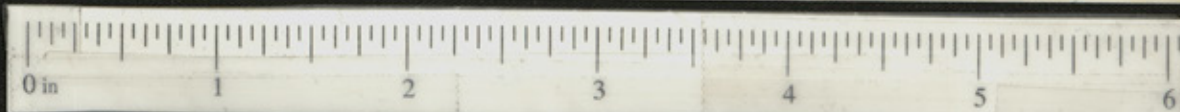

accorded military obsequies.

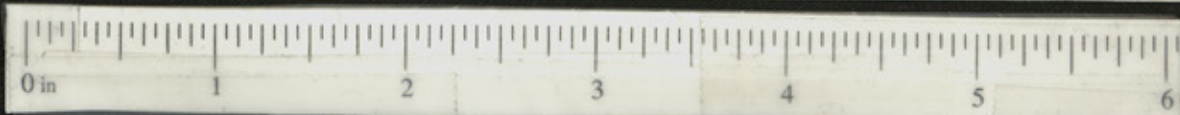
Inasmuch as Colonel

Dear Sir,

I write in behalf of a soldier's widow who is in indigent circumstances. My nephew, Samuel E. DeForest, enlisted in the 17th Conn. Vols. in 1862. He served three years and was under twenty one years old when he was discharged in 1865. He was an elegant penman, exact in giving expression to his thoughts and he was quite successful in transcribing the thoughts of others from dictation. For this reason he was much employed at regimental headquarters, and after the battle of Chan-



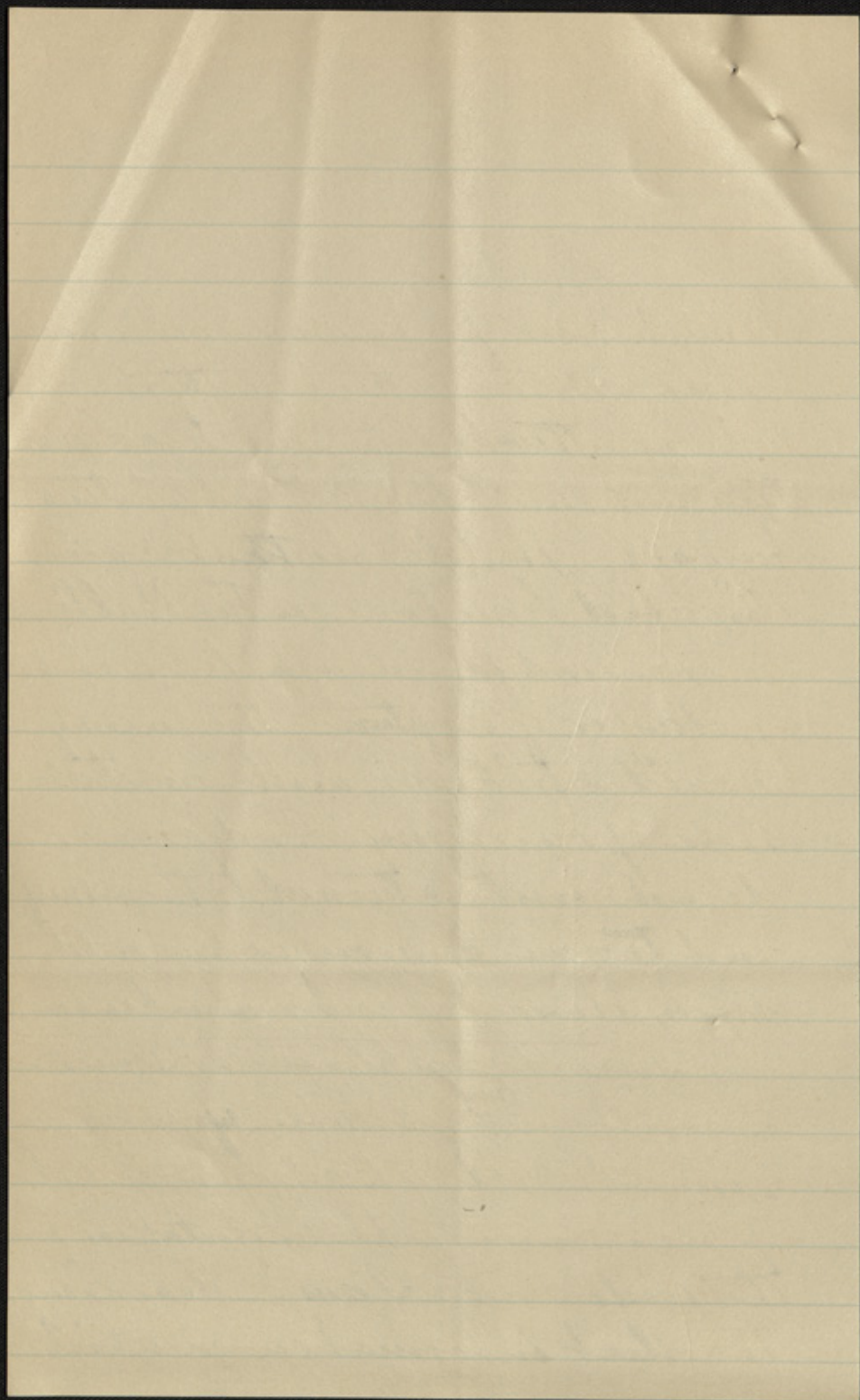
cellorsville he was employed on detailed service as a clerk or other like service. He was in the battle of Chancellorsville and suffered much in the field and on the return march to Brooks Station. His health was so much weakened there that he was not put to active service in the field afterward. He had charge of public property at St. Augustine, Fla. during the last few months of his service and after ^{the} war he lived at Fernandina, Florida, and had charge of the revenue service along that coast. He died there in 1873 of diseases contracted in the army. His widow has supported herself and two children (one now dead) since.



I want to see if a pension can be had for her. At the battle of Gettysburg, he was attached to your headquarters and had charge of headquarters baggage - He told me that you directed him to go on the Baltimore road far enough to be out of danger of capture if the enemy should strike around on that side of our army. He did as ordered and returned to the army and to you as soon as he could safely do so. Do you remember him?

If so, will you please say something to assist in ^{my} Charitable quest?

Gen. W. H. Noble of Bridgeport, The Col. of his regiment, has undertaken for the widow and I am endeavoring to collect information on which



to base a claim for some contribution from the government which I think she deserves.

He was a sergeant in the 17th Conn.
