My Dear General: - I took a flying trip, as I presume your son informed you, to Fort Niagara. I knew that he was there and so did not inform you, as in fact I had no chance to; I did not fix my plan until I started. From there I went to Madison Barracks to look at the question in dispute over purchase of land, rifle range, etc., and had no doubt that Col. Bodge's views were correct. In looking over these two posts, it seemed to me advisable to increase Niagara to a battalion and Ladison Barracks to eight companies, two battalions. Niagara is out of the way but it is a fine reservation, excellent range, and is so near important crossings of the river that it seems worth while to enlarge it. Besides, it is better to do away with one and two company posts and get a full battalion where we can, is it not? Madison Barracks is a fine post and the \$7,000 for the purchase of more land, if used as Col. Dodge recommends, gives an opportunity to enlarge the post to excellent advantage; that, too, being so near the St. Lawrence is a good location. Have talked with Gen. Schofield about both of these points and he approves of this increase, and I should be gld to hear

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your views. I think the allotment for Miagara might be rade from the present appropriation and perhaps a part of that for Madison Barracks. It seemed to me better there to have a mess hall for a post mess and then the present company mess rooms can be used for dormitories. One of the Barrack buildings is very old and a new one will have to be built soon anyway. Please give me your views about these two matters. I have reserved as much as possible of the appropriation pending consideration of these and other changes in your division. It seems to be that the seacoast and the northern border should have special consideration now.

some little while ago the suggestion was made that the tallest liberty pole that could be obtained should be erected adjoining the Navesink Highland lights, that an American flag should be kept floating upon it during daylight taking the place of the lights at night that it might be the first thing visible to the passengers on board ships approaching the Narbor of New York. This proposition has met with such general approval that I feel at Liberty, as the suggestor of the idea to take the next step and that is to appoint you gentlemen a committee, into whose hands shall come the funds and who shall have charge permanently of seeing to it that the flag thus erected shall always continue. It is more than likely that after the first flag is erected, that the governments can be induced to take the matter in hand and thus relieve the committee.

The application for the privilege of erecting this flag was at once made to the secretary of the Treasure, and the consent was received by return mail. Among the first responses received to the suggestion was the following from the National Association of Naval Veterans:

"New York, September 12, 1390."

"Dear Sir:

"When that "Liberty pole' is prected at the Highlands the Farragut Naval Veteran Association of the Port of N.Y., and Naval Post #516 Dept. N.Y., G.A.R., will deem it a pleasure to send a grand detail down to assist in the ceremonies of the first flag raising and it is more than likely that we would take down with us a couple of 12-pound naval howitzers to salute the grand old flag as it ascends skywards to greet the dawn. We feel that the day set apart for this event should be made a memorable one, and we stand ready to do our share, and do it creditably and think it could be arranged that the fort at Sandy Hook could also join in the salute.

Brane, Commanding Maval Station Brooklyn, & Schardt, Collector of Ports, Arch Bishop Corregan and Rev. Chas F. Deems, D.D., will act as Honorary members of this committee. The cost of the pole and flag in N. Y., will not be great and we desire particularly that it shall be paid for by the pennies, nickels and the dimes of the people and that no contribution shall be sent in from any individual exceeding \$1. The suggestion has also been made to Monsieur AUguste Bartholdi that a plan shall be devised by means of which the Tri-Colors and Stars and Stripes shall take the place of the light by night, in the uplifted hand of the "Statux of Liberty Enlightening the World", and we hope that this may be arranged so that we shall have the privilege of saluting the flag of the two greatest Republics on earth, held on high by the Statue of Liberty, on our trip to and from the Navesink Highlands.

### A FLAG AT THE HIGHLANDS.

THE NATIONAL ENSIGN SHOULD BE THE FIRST OBJECT SEEN FROM THE OCEAN.

While on a trip to the West, a number of gentlemen, strangers to each other, met upon the train. One of them, an Englishman born, who had spent twenty-two years in Great Britain before coming to America, had married here, and after twenty-five years in America, had returned to England. Speaking of his first approach to the shore of America, he said that the passengers, with hardly an exception, gave orders that they should be called whenever land was in sight. They were routed out long before daylight, and every one responded. They gathered on deck and began singing "America" and other patriotic songs.

"As soon as they saw the flag," he continued, "without regard to whether they were Americans homeward bound or foreigners for the first time approaching the land of the free, they all seemed overcome by the same pa-triotic emotion." He said in reply to a question that he first saw the Atlantic Highland Lights, but did not see the flag until well into the harbor.

William O. McDowell of No. 120 Liberty street, who was one of the party, said: "Gentlemen, there should be, by the side of the Atlantic Highland Lights, the highest liberty pole that can be obtained in America, with the American flag upon it, to be always seen without regard to weather, from dawn to derivace and here in the fact that darkness, and here is the first dollar to pay the expenses.

At once dollars were chipped in by Colonel George H. Perkins, commander of the Sons of Veterans of New Jersey: Dr. E. A. Bracklow of New York; the English friend, whose address was St. Louis, and whose name Mr. McDotseld has lost, and later by Colonel Ethan Allen of New York. So the fund started. The incident was related by Mr. McDotseld at the meeting of the Sons of Veterans at St. Joseph, Mo., and at once there was a contest between the different States for the honor and privilege. the different States for the honor and privilege of furnishing the liberty pole.

If more money is contributed than is necessary to erect the pole and continue permanently the flag at the Atlantic Highlands the surplus will be used to erect a like pole with a flag upon it at the entrance to San Francisco harbor, and if still a surplus exists it will be used at New Orleans, Boston, Sayannah and other American ports. The following letter was mailed to the Secretary of the Treasury vesterday: yesterday:

No. 120 Liberty Street, No. 120 Liberty Delegation on the government grounds, adjoining the lights, a liberty pole, on which the American flag shall always be visible during daylight. At night the Atlantic Highland Lights will be, to the passenger upon the ship approaching the harbor, the first thing seen, and we desire that by daylight the light shall be replaced by a liberty pole and the Stars and Stripes of the Union.
