Dear Gen. Howard: -

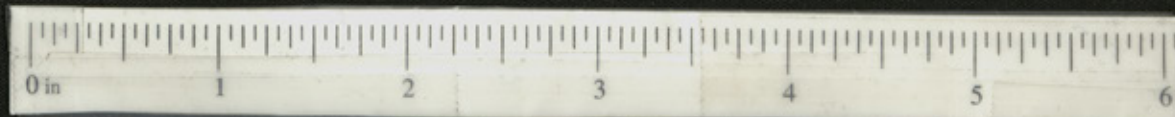

The day has become national as we allege through the action of the First Church in 1865, so it is a good time for us early pilgrims to have a 25th. Anniversary. Besides, at the exercises just had at the First Church there seems to have been an evident intent to ignore oldest inhabitants and first settlers, as I said in my last.

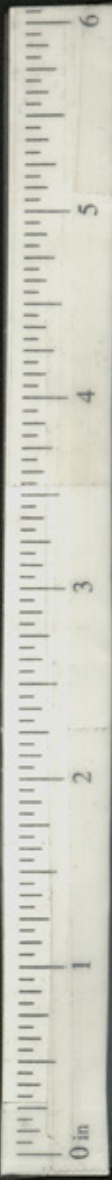
Now at our proposed meeting we want letters from Drs Storrs, Walker, Quint, Hawes, &c, who knew our early history; we want live reminiscences from our early members; we want your work and Dr. Rankin's work spoken of in a really truthful and historic way; we want the record of our departed saints duly set forth. We want the full history of our Sabbath School.

We expect Dr. Rankin will not only give us a poem but an address also. We will have among others that wheel horse of a worker Dr. Presbrey make a speech.

And when we have got all the data and statistics and reminiscences we will put the record in some permanent form.

Since I have been, as it seems to me, with the utmost care and diligence ignored at the church exercises just had, I am very anxious that your letter to us shall show, among other things, what I have always supposed to be the bottom truth, namely, that your connection with the First Church happened in God's providence because I invited and urged you to join our beginnings in the Spring of 1865. As you said, when you came here on your way to take charge at West Point, in an address in our church, "and over there in the corner I see Deane, and but

Now if you can do so, please send us as long and full an historical letter as you can find time to write. Kindly give Dr. Rankin's work here that full and hearty praise that you know and have always said it deserved.

Also will you kindly put one line in every one of the accompanying letters, to the effect that you endorse Brother Deane's request. Or suppose you write that on each letter.

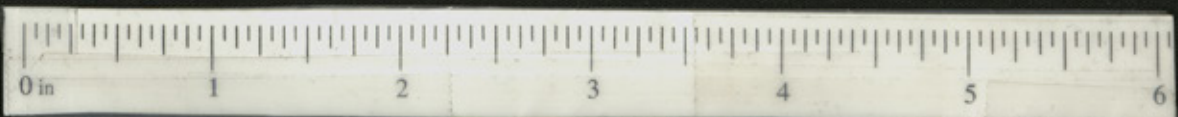
I feel sure you will heartily approve our plan and will give us your very valuable help in making it a success.

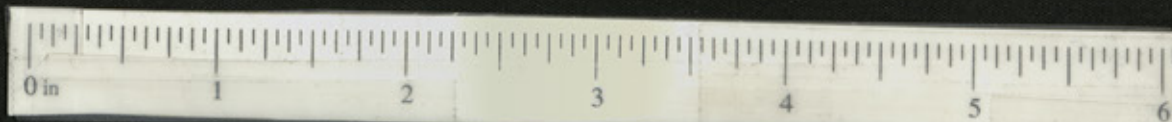
Secretary of War, and I believe that
